The orders of the Board of management of the I. C. R. doing away with the night operation on Robbsey, Colborne and Memramook went into force last night. Henceforth these stations will be closed each night at 7 o'clock.

Mrs. Albert E. Coombs of Rockland Road, met with a painful accident at Seaside Park Saturday afternoon. She was struck in the back with a stone, and rendered unconscious. Dr. L. M. Curran attended the woman and although she is badly shaken up, serious results are not expected.

A large number of people attended the funeral of the late Mrs. M. Lantulum which took place yesterday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock from her residence, 104 Union street. The remains were taken to the Cathedral, where the burial service was read by Rev. A. W. Meahan. Interment was made in the old Catholic cemetery. Relatives acted as pall bearers.

Plans have been made to continue the observation of the silver jubilee of the St. Peter's church during the present week. High mass was sung this morning at 8 o'clock in the presence of a large congregation. This evening at 7:30 o'clock there will be rosary, sermon and benediction. Rev. J. Woods, C. S. R., will deliver a sermon on "Our Patron." A large congregation is expected to attend.

A gang of young toughs, who have been frequenting Lombard street, invaded Paradise Row last night and stationed themselves near the corner of Kinella's marble shop. Stones were hurled at pedestrians and a fight between the members of the gang, Officers Smith and Merrick headed of the affair but upon reaching the corner the birds had flown. This is the same gang who indulged in a base ball on Sunday afternoon and evenings on Lombard St.

The handicap sports will be held this evening on the Victoria grounds at 7 o'clock sharp. There is a fine list of entries and both the sprint and distance races will be very exciting. He was conveyed to the Notre Dame Hospital and the physicians operated on the leg. Major B. K. Armstrong visited the young soldier at the hospital. He informed the star this morning that the break was a clean one near the ankle. Lieut. Allan remained with the injured soldier in Montreal.

WALLACE GETS THREE YEARS BUT MAY BE DEPORTED

Took Judge Forbes Just Eight Minutes to Dispose of the Check-Raiser This Morning

Under the speedy trials act, before Judge Forbes this morning, Frank Wallace, after pleading guilty to the charge of obtaining goods under false pretenses by means of a forged check, was sentenced to three years in Dorchester penitentiary. Efforts will be made to deport Wallace to the United States.

The case was heard at eleven o'clock and eight minutes were sufficient to finish the sitting.

Wallace admitted the charge and in answer to queries from Judge Forbes declared that he had been in the United States since he was six years old. Since his return he had visited Montreal and Moncton, but could not secure work. He reached St. John with the intention of returning to the United States.

His Honor stated that Canada did not desire a man who had acquired such cleverness as Wallace. There were a number of other shifty matters in which the prisoner was connected.

Upon sentence being pronounced the court adjourned.

THEY HAD A GREAT TIME AT PETAWAWA

Artillerymen Learned Quite a Lot in the Week

Used the New Aiming Rifle and Found it a Valuable Aid—Sixty Pounder to Replace 4-7 Guns—Home This Morning

The St. John Artillerymen who have been at Petawawa reached the city on return at 4 o'clock this morning on a special train over the I. C. R. Detachments from the three batteries of the 3rd Regiment left here at 4 o'clock in the afternoon on Saturday, July 24th, the special train conveying one hundred and twenty men and twelve officers. The train and party were under command of Major L. W. Barker, who also commanded No. 3 Battery, while Major Harrison was in charge of No. 1 and Major Smith of No. 2. Going by I. C. R. the Artillerymen changed to the C. P. R. in Montreal and reached Petawawa at 8 p. m. Sunday. Everything was in readiness for their arrival; they were met by officers from the camp and within half an hour were comfortably settled for the night.

On Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday the men were working all the time, scarcely an idle minute being allowed them. Unquestionably they received the best instruction ever given them, including a course of new material which will be of value in their regular work here. They were able to use for the first time the one-inch aiming rifle and the 47 gun just as the morning hour was comfortably settled for the night.

In the work at Petawawa the shooting all through was good, and although the men of course cannot tell what the marks will be, they expect a fairly high standing. Particularly creditable was the fire discipline, the work of the men on the gun could scarcely be improved and this applies to all three batteries. There were three instructional and two competitive series for each battery besides the work with the aiming rifle.

Only the 47 gun was used, but next year there will be practice with the new sixty pounder, a 5-inch gun which is but to be very much superior to the 47 now in use. It is more easily manipulated, the recoil is all taken by the buffers, and it operated on most of the batteries. The new twelve pounder are on the field at Petawawa but the local men were given opportunity to work with these field guns, nor were they in use while the St. John men were in camp.

The detachments left Petawawa at 10 o'clock last Friday night and reached Montreal early on Saturday morning. They spent the whole day there, entraining in the evening. Their orders were to stop at Matapedia so as to come through New Brunswick on Sunday. They left Matapedia at 4 o'clock Sunday evening and had a fast run to St. John, reaching the city at 4 o'clock this morning.

The weather at Petawawa was ideal. Heavy rain fell on Thursday night but by morning the weather had cleared and before work had commenced the ground was quite dry. Altogether it was the finest trip the St. John Artillerymen ever had.

MAGISTRATE HAS NOT SENT THE EVIDENCE

Lively Time Expected When the Driscoll Beer Case Comes Up Before Judge Forbes Tomorrow

The beer appeal case of the King vs. Timothy Driscoll comes up again for argument before His Honor Judge Forbes in Chambers tomorrow morning at eleven o'clock, should Magistrate Ritchie, before whom the convictions were made and from whose decision the appeal is taken, still refuse to sign the evidence and forward it to C. H. Ferguson, clerk of the county court, by tomorrow morning, further adjournment will have to be made. Mr. Ferguson informed the Star this morning that he had not yet received the evidence. It is understood that Mr. John A. Barry, counsel for the appellant, made a formal demand to have the evidence sent down but could not get satisfaction from the magistrate. Mr. Barry will likely report the matter to the attorney general or else apply for a writ of mandamus to compel the magistrate to forward the evidence. His Honor Judge Forbes may also take a hand in the matter, at any rate tomorrow morning's proceedings will be awaited with interest.
