Of the four wards contested on the license issue, business interests would be relatively larger in Lansdowne than in the other three and Lansdowne retains licenses. This result will show the opponents of license that they will meet with greater resistance as of license that they will meet with greater resistance as they press their campaign into the trading sections of the town. "Sec. 112. The Assessors shall escertain, as nearly as possible, the particulars of the Real Estate, the Personal Estate, and the Income of any person who has not brought in a statement in accordance with their notice, and as required by this law, and shall make an estimate thereof, as the true value and amount, to the best of their information and belief; and such estimate shall be conclusive upon all persons who have not filed their statements in due time, unless they can show a reasonable excuse for the omission.
