

Tonight, at 8 o'clock, The Standard's Great \$6,000 Prize Contest Closes

Candidates Should Not Lose Any Time but Send in Subscriptions and Reserve Vote Coupons Early--No Votes Issued After the Closing Hour

THE RULES.

About Getting the Votes In.

Every facility will be afforded the contestants and their friends for getting their votes into the Standard office. Experience teaches us that there will be a crowd about the office when the close of the polls approaches. In spite of the warnings that some of the candidates will put off getting in their subscriptions and votes until the last possible moment.

Contestants who fail to win a prize will be paid ten (10) per cent. cash commission on the gross amount of subscription money which they turned into the contest department during the campaign if they have been active workers to the end of the contest.

The rules governing the closing of the contest are printed below. Read them carefully.

Contestants cannot be too careful about sending in their ballots—the yellow vote certificates—so that they will reach the contest department before 8 p. m., Saturday, June 8, 1912, and as a matter of precaution every one of them should read and weigh each line of what is printed here.

The Standard would dislike to see any candidate lose a single vote because of the excitement which has been caused during the last few hours of the contest, or because of some misunderstanding on the part of any contestant. It is impossible for any one to exercise too much caution in arriving at a full understanding of the

rules and conditions governing the close of the contest.

First—All votes and remittances, no matter at what time mailed, must be received at the office of the contest department, The Standard building, St. John, N. B., before 8 p. m., Saturday, June 8th, or they will be worthless and will not be counted.

Second—All remittances and votes mailed after noon, Friday, June 7th, should bear a special delivery stamp. Third—All remittances should be addressed to the contest manager, The Standard, and not to individuals. This is to prevent confusion.

Fourth—No personal cheques will be accepted on the closing day, unless certified. Postoffice or express money orders, drafts or certified cheques or currency will be accepted in payment of subscriptions. Please note this carefully and do not present personal cheques in payment of subscriptions on Saturday, June 8th, the closing day of the contest.

Look over the above conditions carefully. Do not jump at the conclusion that you understand any part of them until you are absolutely sure of its full meaning. If the precaution of careful reading is taken there should be no vain regrets concerning votes rejected because they did not conform to the rules of the contest. If in doubt concerning any point, ask questions until everything is clear. It is extremely dangerous to remain in ignorance of any of the rules which govern the closing.

The votes will be counted as usual at 5 o'clock, Friday afternoon and the result printed in The Standard, Saturday, June 8th. After this count, the ballot box will not be open again until the final count is commenced at 8 p. m., Saturday, June 8th. Get your reserves in the ballot box early Friday or Saturday, so you will not miss any of them. Do not lose any of them for they will be counted on your getting duplicates at this late period of the contest. Do not trust to slow mails. A delay of a few hours may lose a prize for you. Mail them in time to reach this office early Saturday, June 8th or you are apt to lose out.

Go in today, tomorrow and the next day to win or forever hold your peace. The race is now up to you and your friends.

Do not ask to have vote ballots issued on subscriptions without the name of the candidate for whom they are to be voted written thereon. The request cannot be complied with. All votes must bear the name of the candidate for whom they are to be voted before they leave this office. Scratched, torn or altered vote certificates will be promptly discarded. 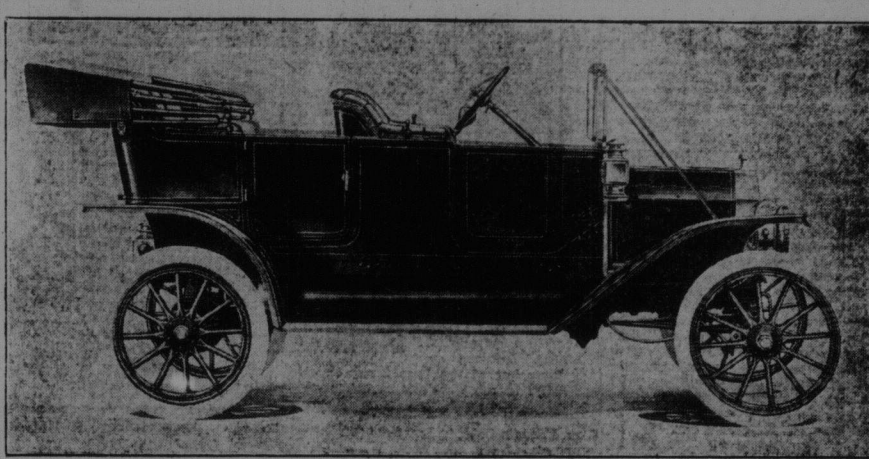

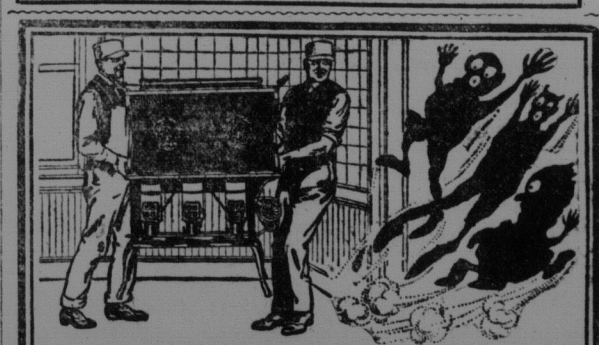
