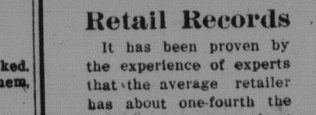

## EXPRESS MEN WILL TOUR CITY TODAY

Question of Free Delivery  
Limits—May be Considered  
Again After Ground Has  
Been Covered.

James Hardwell, of the Canadian  
railways commission; V. G. R. Vic-  
kers, general manager of the Dominion  
Express Company, and V. H. Barr,  
traffic manager of the company, ar-  
rived in the city last evening.

Messrs. Vickers and Barr have been  
making a tour of the Maritime Pro-  
vinces in connection with the com-  
pany's business. To the Standard last  
night Mr. Vickers said that he had  
found the volume of business done by  
the company during the past year in  
the provinces to have been very large,  
and anticipated an even greater  
amount this year.

Mr. Hardwell has also been visiting  
the different cities of the provinces as  
representative of the railway com-  
mission looking into the matter of free  
delivery limits. Today in company with  
Recorder J. B. M. Baxter and the vis-  
iting express company officials, he  
will make a tour of the city, on both  
sides of the harbor.

The chief difficulty to be solved by  
the representative of the commission  
is whether or not the West Side will  
be included in the free delivery  
routes. According to the area now  
marked out, the people of the West  
Side are not included in the free de-  
livery privilege.

The express com-  
pany representatives say the volume  
of business destined for the West  
Side is not sufficiently large, the for-  
eign tolls are high and there is consid-  
erable delay required to cross. Mr.  
Hardwell will visit the West Side to-  
day therefore, to personally investi-  
gate the case.

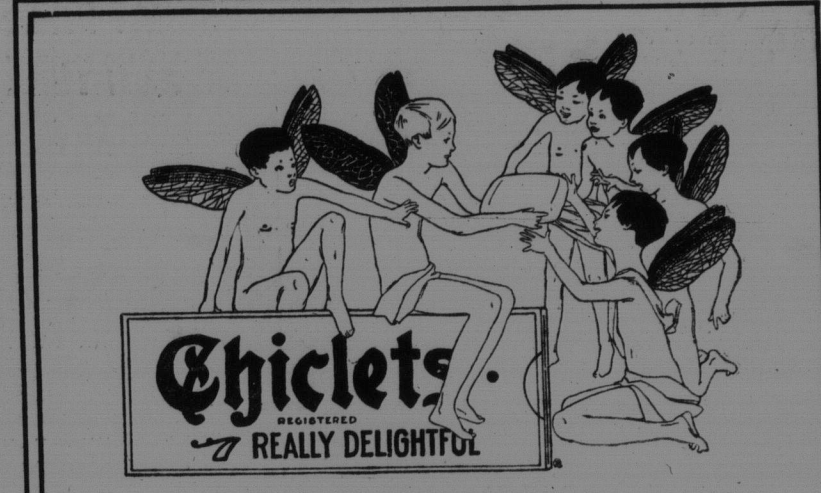
