RUSSIANS DEFEATED BY RUSSIANS NEAR RIGA

RUSSIANS OCCUPY GERMAN POSITIONS ON RIGA FRONT

Enemy Sustains Severe Losses in Sector of Silzeme in Region South of Pskoff Road—German Raid Repulsed by British—Violent Artillery Duel North of Verdun.

Petrograd, Sept. 24.—Russian forces on the Riga front, in the region south of the Pskoff high road, yesterday took the offensive and, after a fierce struggle, occupied the German positions in the sector of Silzeme, the Russian front was advanced today. The Germans sustained severe losses and left 400 corpses on the battle field. The Russians took sixty prisoners and ten machine guns. The text of the statement reads: "Northern front. In the region of the Riga, south of the Pskoff high road our detachments initiating an attack occupied after a fierce struggle, the enemy positions in the sector of Silzeme, one mile to the northeast of Spalttimmerman. The enemy losses were severe and on the battle field we found more than four hundred corpses. We captured sixty prisoners and ten machine guns. "General Sokolov was wounded in the head by a shrapnel splinter."

GT. NORTHWESTERN TELEGRAPHERS OUT

Strike General from Campbellton Westward.

Toronto, Sept. 24.—The Great Northwestern operators walked out of the main and branch offices at 11 a. m. Quebec, Sept. 24.—At 11 today part of the G. N. W. telegraphers walked out of the head office here. The general strike of the operators is on now from Campbellton, N. B., to Calgary. In Quebec city, so far, only part of the men have walked out, and business is still going on as smoothly as before. In all the Quebec district some seventy operators are interested in the strike, and it is not known whether they will all leave work.

DREAD INFANTILE PARALYSIS IN N. B.

Parents Advised to Keep Close Watch Over Children.

Fredericton, Sept. 24.—Dr. R. H. McGrath, secretary of the Provincial Board of Health, reports that within the last week several cases of infantile paralysis have developed in the province. One of these is at Campbellton, and the others at Grand Falls. At the latter place two cases were reported some days ago. The others have developed since. All boards of health are doing their utmost to control the dread disease and prevent its spread. Parents anywhere in the province will do well to investigate and have immediate medical attention given to all cases of violent illness in children, with sudden pains in the neck and feverish symptoms.

CONVICTED FOR MANSLAUGHTER

Howland, Me., Hotel Man Found Guilty of Death of French Canadian.

Bangor, Me., Sept. 24.—The jury in the Howland murder trial returned a verdict of manslaughter as to Benjamin Moran, a Howland hotel keeper, and assault and battery as to Daniel Robinson, both of whom were charged with killing Michael Nadeau, a French-Canadian, and throwing his body into the Piscataquis river last December. The affair was caused by a drunken row in an automobile. A Charlotetown, P.E.I., man was a witness.

SCHOONER IS LOST WITH ALL HANDS

The George M. Warner, New York for Yarmouth, Given Up.

The schooner George M. Warner, Capt. Augustus Haycock, which sailed from New York Aug. 2, for Yarmouth, with coal, is thought to have been lost with all hands, as she has never been heard from since. Her owners are Paul L. and L. M. Hatfield of Arcadia, N. S. She was formerly owned in Digby county and was built at Gilbert's Cove 29 years ago. Besides Capt. Haycock, who leaves a widow in Yarmouth, the crew were Mate E. B. Allbright of Freeport, N.S.; Cook Levi Porter, Arcadia; Albert Smoker, Mesogan, and John McCormack of Weymouth.

SHKIH-UL-ISLAM DEAD AT NINETY

Leader of Mohammedanism Passes Away in Cairo.

Cairo, Sept. 24.—The Shkhi-Ul-Islam, the Mohammedan leader, is dead. The Shkhi-Ul-Islam, Selim-El-Richt, was president of El Azhar University, the principal centre of Moslem teaching throughout the world. The venerable leader of Islam was 90 years of age.

"How Many of our Men are Liable to be Drafted?"

The Canadian business man is asking this question often, now that the Military Service Act is the law of Canada. A simple means of answering it at once is being provided.

Medical Boards are in process of formation throughout the country for the free physical examination of all men who apply. The first class liable to call includes all single men and widowers without children between the ages of 20 and 34 inclusive, all men married after July 6, 1917, being classed as single for the purposes of the Act. In a very short time, the average employer may learn how many of his staff are liable for selection. Those adjudged physically unfit will be given a certificate which will secure them exemption from any ground. The employer will be given a chance to decide if he should seek exemption for any employee whose physical condition renders him liable for selection.

This early medical examination, which quickly decides if a man is liable for selection or not, is a feature of the operation of the Military Service Act calculated to appeal strongly to the business community. It assists in definite planning for the future, enabling an employer of labor to learn at once what men will be left at their work and those who may be removed for military service. Haphazard withdrawals, the nightmare of business men of method and precision, are insured against by this timely arrangement.

Every employer of labor will find it to his advantage to note carefully the formation of Medical Boards in his locality and to be sure that his employees secure as early as possible this very important information as to their status under the Military Service Act.
