Paris, Feb. 21.—A German Austrian

Austria's difficulties are threefold—food, coal and finance, according to Dr. Brunnau, one of the Austrian delegates. He said that misery and famine were threatened unless the food situation was relieved soon.

Lack of coal, Dr. Brunaels continued, was throwing many men out of work and was compelling the government to pay relief in lieu of wages. The financial difficulties, he said, resulted from the debts left by the monarchy. Dr. Brunaels said it was proposed to appoint a committee to determine the share of the debt which each of the various new divisions of the old empire shall bear.
