County Council Finance Committee

Met Yesterday to Consider Matters in Connection With Issue of Bonds to Pay for Nurses' Home.

A meeting of the Finance Committee of the County Council was held yesterday afternoon to consider matters in connection with an issue of bonds to pay for the Nurses' Home. The Council authorized the issue of \$200,000, but it was decided yesterday to issue \$100,000. Part of the issue will be 4 per cent. bonds for ten years, the same to be redeemable at the expiration of the ten-year period at the rate of interest then prevailing for a further period of thirty years. The balance of the issue will be for thirty years at 6 per cent. The bonds will be in denominations of \$200, \$500 and \$1,000. The receipt given this issue will probably determine whether or not an issue for the other \$100,000 required will be made in the near future. Tenders will be called for shortly.

Maritime Students' Convention Held

A Great Success at Mount Allison When Many Students Met at Convention and Renewed Friendship.

The Maritime Students' Convention held at Mount Allison recently is reported to have been a great success. This was the first annual meeting and was held at Sackville from May 28th to June 4th under the auspices of the students Y. M. C. A. of the Province. Almost continuously since 1850 students from Ontario, Quebec and the Maritime Provinces have met at conventions held at Northfield, Connecticut. The first convention for Eastern Canada took place at Lake Brome, Quebec, last year. Then it was decided to hold the first Maritime Province meeting at Sackville in 1920.

Toronto, Ont. June 7.—The financial statement of the Tuckett Tobacco Co. Ltd. for the year 1919-March 31 last, shows profits of \$33,131, an increase of \$8,018 over the previous year. Added to balance carried forward this makes \$79,677 available for distribution. Total assets stand at \$6,948,676, as compared with \$5,794,531 in previous year. Current assets are \$2,897,871, against \$2,676,189. Current liabilities were \$949,698, against \$832,467. The annual general meeting of shareholders of the Tuckett Tobacco Co. Ltd. will be held in Hamilton, June 17th.
