### County Council Finance Committee

Met Yesterday to Consider Matters in Connection With Issue of Bonds to Pay for Nurses' Home.

A meeting of the Finance Committee of the County Council was held yesterday afternoon to consider matters in connection with an issue of bonds to pay for the Nurses' Home. The Council authorized the issue of \$300,000, but it was decided yesterday to issue \$100,000. Part of the issue will be 4 per cent. bonds for ten years, the same to be redeemable at the expiration of the ten-year period at the rate of interest then prevailing for a further period of thirty years. The balance of the issue will be for thirty years at 6 per cent. The bonds will be in denominations of \$200, \$500 and \$1,000. The reception given this issue will probably determine whether or not an issue for the other \$200,000 required will be made in the near future. Tenders will be called for shortly.

### Common Council Met In Committee

Delegation from West Side Asked for Better Water Service—Purchase of Aerial Ladder Truck Recommended—The North End Playgrounds.

At the committee meeting of the common council held yesterday morning the members of J. B. Wilson of \$250 for painting the roof and that of James Sprad of \$850 for painting the exterior of the Free Public Library, were accepted.

Commissioner Thomson reported that the Playgrounds Association refused to have anything to do with the old Shamrock Grounds and was authorized to try and negotiate a lower price for the lot offered by Armstrong and Bruce.

Commissioner Jones brought up the matter of an aerial ladder truck and a motion to recommend the purchase of the truck passed.

### Police Court Cases Yesterday

Three Liquor Cases Before the Court—Vagrant and Fifteen Drunks Were Remanded to Jail.

The only case to be dealt with in the police court yesterday afternoon was that of Harry Finnegan who was arrested by Inspector Merryfield early in the afternoon on Main Street. The charge preferred was that of selling liquor without a license. The defendant claimed that he had given half of the contents away. The case was postponed to this morning at eleven o'clock when the druggist will give evidence.

The morning's docket was quite up to the standard set by previous week and receptions. Fifteen drunks pleaded guilty, and were remanded. Fines of \$200 or six months for having liquor in their possession illegally were struck against Peter McDade, and against Albert A. Irvine. Maynard Kaiser, a vagrant, was remanded.

Dei Willis, held on suspicion of having committed theft, was remanded. Kenneth A. Wilson appeared in his defense.

A charge of having liquor in his possession for illegal purposes was preferred against Allen Albert, colored, 307 Guilford street, West Side. The charge was the result of a raid on the night, made by Inspector Merryfield and policemen Garnett and Gill.

Inspector Merryfield stated that when he asked the accused if there was any liquor in the house he replied in the negative. Later he pointed out a half bottle of gin. Harry Ring and another man were in the house at the time.

King's wife took the stand and stated that her husband frequented the Albert house from which he returned home the worse for liquor. She also said that other white men went there. The case was postponed to stand until Wednesday, that the defendant might procure a lawyer.

### THE COUNTY COURT

In the county court yesterday morning before His Honor Judge Armstrong, hearing was begun in the case against Charles Ritchie, Albert and Thomas Connell in connection with the charges of breaking and entering the house of L. B. Ryan on the Sandy Point road and stealing. Evidence was given by Detectives Biddiscombe and Donahue, Neil Donovan, L. R. Ross and James O'Leary, which closed the case for the crown. The defense concluded their case in the afternoon. The jury brought in a verdict of guilty on the charge of breaking and entering.

W. M. Ryan appeared for prosecution, and W. R. Scott for the defense.

### A NEW BOYS' WORK SECRETARY

A new Boys' Work Secretary had been appointed for St. John to take the place held by F. S. Woodworth last year, who has gone to take up his duties at the St. John's branch of the Y. M. C. ### TUCKETT'S INCREASE THEIR SURPLUS

Toronto, Ont., June 7.—The financial statement of the Tuckett Tobacco Co. Ltd. for the year 1919-March 31 last, shows profits of \$333,131, an increase of \$69,018 over the previous year. Added to balance carried forward this makes \$796,177 available for distribution. Total assets stand at \$6,948,676, as compared with \$5,794,531 in previous year. Current assets are \$2,397,871, against \$2,075,189. Current liabilities were \$949,698, against \$832,467. The annual general meeting of shareholders of the Tuckett Tobacco Co. Ltd., will be held in Hamilton, June 17th.

### FUNERALS.

Georgetown, June 4.—Flage were at half past ten, and practically the entire community was present at St. John's Church this afternoon to attend the funeral of John St. Dunn, who passed away so suddenly on Wednesday evening.

Representatives from every community in Queens County were present, as well as from St. John and Fredericton, and the congregation, one of the largest ever seen in the church, comprising all classes and creeds, from a judge of the Supreme Court to the humblest Indian on the reserve, bore mute testimony to the universal regard in which the deceased gentleman was held.

The burial service was read by the rector, Rev. H. T. Buckland, and a special choir sang the hymns, Lead Kindly Light, Saviour, Keep Me Near the Cross, and Abide with Me, after which the pallbearers, William Weston, R. Harvey Weston, J. P. Reid, J. L. Allingham, Gabriel DeVeber and C. A. McKenzie, carried the flower-laden casket to the family lot in St. John's Churchyard, where interment was made. The floral tributes were many and very handsome.
