

SKATERS SMASH WORLD'S RECORDS AT BINGHAMPTON

Arthur Staff Skates 440 Yards in 37 Seconds, and Tied With Lamy in Two Miles, Time 5.45—Gladys Robinson Went Hundred Yards in 11 2-5, and 220 in 22 1-5.

Bighamton, N. Y., Feb. 19—Four world's records were shattered in the international ice skating champion ships here yesterday. The sensational skating of Miss Gladys Robinson, Toronto, featured the meet. The international amateur women champion broke two world's records, those of the 100 yard and the 220 yard dash. She skated the century in 11.25 seconds, or 35 of a second faster than the world's record, and the 220 yard dash in 22.15 seconds, or a full second faster than the previous world's record.

Arthur Staff, of Chicago, and Edmund Lamy, of Saranac Lake, skating a dead heat, broke the two mile record of five minutes and 28 seconds by three full seconds. The former record was made twelve years ago by Lamy at a meeting in Cleveland. Staff broke his own record for the 440 yard dash by one-fifth of a second, skating the quarter in 37 seconds.

Miss Rob nson's feat of breaking two world's records is considered remarkable in view of the fact that it marks the second time within the week that the Canadian skating wonder has established a new mark, for Wednesday Miss Robinson broke the 220 yard record at Saranac Lake. At that time it was 23.25 seconds. She skated it in 23.1-3. Her remarkable work in skating the turn, experts as d, was responsible for her clipping a full second off the new record at yester-day week the new record at yester-day week
