RUSSIANS LOSE HEAVILY IN PORT ARTHUR SORTIE

Naval Guns at Stronghold Reported Worn Out--Kuropatkin Short of Supplies and Orders Can't Be Filled--Russian Guard Officers Called Out to Fill Up the Gaps--Japs in Force Near Mukden.

Port Arthur Sortie Repulsed. London, Sept. 19--A despatch from Tokio to a news agency says: "A strong Russian force made a sortie from Port Arthur the afternoon of Sept. 17, and attacked the Tetszen fort, which was recently captured by the Japanese."

Port Arthur Guns Worn Out. London, Sept. 20--The Morning Post's Shanghai correspondent telegraphs that there is an unconfirmed rumor there that General Mishchenko, commander of the Russian Eastern Cosack brigade, has been killed.

Japan Movements Concealed. Berlin, Sept. 19--3.40 p. m.--A despatch to the Lokal Anzeiger from Mukden says: "The Japanese dispositions are completely screened behind a line of outposts and it is almost impossible to obtain information from behind this veil."

Water-Logged Schooner in Bay Not Identified. Digby, N. S., Sept. 19--(Special)--No further news has been received from the unknown water-logged topmast schooner sighted in the Bay of Fundy Thursday.

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Archbishop of Canterbury at Bar Harbor Reception. Bar Harbor, Me., Sept. 19--The Archbishop of Canterbury attended a reception this afternoon at the parish grounds of St. Saviour's church. This was the first public reception in which his grace has participated since his arrival in America, and he seemed to greatly enjoy the occasion.
