EFFICIENT HOUSEKEEPING

A recent report from cold storage men shows that thirty-three million dollars are now held in storage and that a large part of these must be moved immediately.

This report is encouraging to housekeepers everywhere who have watched with interest the boycott started by housewives in New York City and eagerly joined by Mrs. Woodrow Wilson, wife of the President of the United States.

With fresh eggs selling at sixty-five cents a dozen in city stores and storage eggs at thirty-seven to forty cents, it is the duty of every woman to take her family's welfare at heart, to take an active part in this campaign.

In Chicago, the school children have joined the movement for lower priced eggs and when conditions are such that one little one has the necessity of buying their little mite to lower high priced food, it is time that gambling in eggs and butter be stopped.

It is doubtful if any city or state can permanently check the evil methods of cold storage "combine," but the federal government can. Representative D. McKellar, of Tennessee, has introduced a measure in the House to regulate cold storage shipments in every state.

You can boost this McKellar bill and get your friends to help and this will be much better than starting boycotts that deprive you of the food that you need and should have.

Regulation of cold storage food is properly a national matter and Congress can handle it by placing a definite time limit upon the storage of food. We have no greater blessing than that of cold storage, but nothing is so much abused.

So great is the evil power of the interests that control our food products that Congress may not be able to act in this matter, but this aim of the McKellar bill is so reasonable and good that every one should do their best to make it a success.
