METAGAMA AT QUEBEC  
WITH MANY PASSENGERS  
Quebec, July 29.—The Canadian Pacific  
ocean service steamship Metagama ar-  
rived in port yesterday afternoon from  
Liverpool after a voyage of eight days.  
She carried 224 cabin and 181 third-  
class passengers, besides about 65 offi-  
cers, non-commissioned officers and men  
of the Canadian overseas forces. The  
majority are back on leave. The major-  
ity of the cabin and all of the third-  
class passengers disembarked here.

Golden Opportunity.

two men are wanted immediately to

out many opportunities to achieve dis-  
tinction for acts of valor, it is as lucra-  
tive as any other branch of the service,

mendation as are those going overseas.  
Men desiring to do home service in this

cruiting headquarters. The catch has been  
extended throughout New Brunswick  
and it is felt that in a very short time  
the desired quota of men will be secured.

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## MANY OFFICERS FIELD LIVES IN GREAT OFFENSIVE

Canadians in British Army Among the  
Killed—Lieut. R. Newton, For-  
merly of Agricultural Department,  
Has Been Wounded.

Some idea of the gallantry of the offi-  
cers in the British army is given by the  
fact that in the officers' casualties the  
percentage of "killed in action" is very  
high.

The most recent report on British  
casualties in the Canadian army, that  
on July 28 the report from the western  
front.

Nineteen deaths were reported to the  
head of the last week, as follows:  
Broncho pneumonia, five; senility, two;  
infant, two; measles, meningitis, em-  
bolism, premature birth, spine, bil-  
disease, cardiac asthma, diabetes, acute  
myocarditis, cholera infantum and tal-  
cums of stomach, each one.

Good progress is being made in the  
efforts to develop the tungsten mine at  
Burnt Hill on the Southwest Miramichi.  
About forty or fifty men have been  
working there for the past two months.  
Large quantities of ore are being  
taken out. Milling operations will likely  
be carried on in the near future and  
the market for the finished product is  
very satisfactory indeed.

The Vancouver News-Advertiser of  
July 18, says that Rev. Dr. Chappell,  
dean of the school of theology, Tokio,  
is visiting the western city. Dr. Chap-  
pell is a native of Prince Edward Island,  
and thirty years ago was well known  
in Methodist circles in New Brunswick,  
leaving here to do missionary work in  
British Columbia. He subsequently re-  
turned to Prince Edward Island, but in  
1889 entered the foreign missionary field  
where he has since labored.

Flour prices have taken the aviation  
bug again and wholesalers have been  
advised of another increase in Manitoba  
and Ontario flour. Saturday word was  
received that the price of flour had ad-  
vanced twenty cents per barrel, making  
the retail price \$7.50 per barrel, and  
another advance of twenty cents has now  
been recorded and these brands con-  
sidered are retailing at \$8 a barrel. The  
advance in Ontario flour was twenty-  
five cents and it is now retailing at \$7.10  
per barrel.

The fact that the embargo placed on  
lobsters by the French government has  
been removed, will mean much to the  
packers of the maritime provinces. It  
is estimated that about forty thousand  
cases of lobsters, valued at \$800,000, was  
left on their hands when the French or-  
der was issued, especially noted as such  
as big cities go or we in Canada in our

Brief Despatches.

London, July 28.—When the court of  
criminal appeal met today to hear a  
possible application, in behalf of Roger  
Casement, who was sentenced to death  
for treason in connection with the recent  
Dublin uprising, it was found that the  
defense had abandoned any contemplated  
action.

Chicago, July 28.—Illinois and neigh-  
boring states found no relief today from  
the unusual heat wave and there was a  
probability that the record of 100 de-  
grees yesterday might be broken. In  
Chicago down street thermometers early  
this morning stood at 96 degrees, higher  
than several degrees than the maximum  
of the night before.

Deaths, directly due to the heat, num-  
bered seventeen for the twenty-four  
hours of the day, and the total number  
of deaths and serious cases for the main-  
tenance of their two score prostrations were  
reported.
