GOOD PROSPECTS FOR APPLE EXPORTS

Less European Competition for North American Apples in European Markets. One of the market specialists in the employ of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, thinks the market outlook in Europe for apples from North America in the present season exceedingly promising. The principal European markets are in England and Germany with important secondary markets in the Scandinavian countries. All these countries in normal years are largely supplied from other parts of Europe, but in the present year nearly all European sources of supply are pretty well dried up. Switzerland, one of the principal surplus apple countries of the continent, will not have over a 75 per cent crop, and the Italian Tyrol will not have over a tenth of the apples produced in 1924. Czechoslovakia, which usually supplies the German market, will also have a very light apple crop this year and in all the European countries which produce apples for export, there is almost a total failure this season. Shortage of pears and apples in European countries has, however, been fairly well offset by the expansion that has taken place in Australia's fruit industry. In the Australian season now about closed 2,153,115 boxes of apples from that source, and 200,000 of pears, have been exported to the United Kingdom. But, despite the volume of these exports, prices of Australian fruit have risen higher than usual. Moreover, Australian supplies will be all off the English markets by the time ours really begin to move and people in England will again be hungry for apples.
