Tobacco Growers Get Good Prices
Possibly the highest price of Virginia leaf tobacco ever recorded in this country was realized by a hundred or more growers in Leamington district this week, when the Imperial Tobacco Company purchased their crops.
Of a list of 26 growers whose crops were bought, 389 acres of tobacco brought to producers \$220,000, or an average of \$554 per acre. In round figures about 400,000 pounds was bought at an average of 38-10 cents.

Excellent Address on Women's Work for King and Empire.
A large and enthusiastic rally of Twin-City War Workers were in attendance at the regular monthly meeting of the Princess of Wales Chapter on Thursday afternoon at the D. S. O. Rooms, King street. Mrs. John Bruce, President of the National Executive of the Daughters of the Empire, Toronto, was present and gave a most inspiring address on "Women's Work for King and Empire," quoting no less an authority than Premier David Lloyd George of Great Britain to the fact that the women of the Allied Nations made victor in the Great War possible by the splendid way in which they came forward to do their part in hospitals, in munition factories, in administrative offices and in places of business. The women, Mrs. Bruce said, recognized in the struggle a crusade for righteousness and gentleness, two social qualities that make a strong appeal to the feminine heart and mind. So it was that the mothers and wives and daughters of the world entered into the great international struggle, as they had never before done in the history of modern civilization. Mrs. Bruce closed with a strong appeal to every member of the I. O. D. E. to do their part in teaching every young person growing up to be a Canadian man or woman the meaning of British institutions, the glory of British ideals and the duties of Canadian citizenship.
An appropriate and sweetly rendered solo "Canada Ever" was contributed by Miss Wolfe, and the usual reception and presentation made to the brave soldier boys who had returned since the last meeting of the Chapter.
Mrs. Bruce was made the recipient of a handsome bouquet together with a hearty vote of appreciation of her most instructive and inspiring address.
Tea was served at the close and a most delightful social hour much enjoyed by the record breaking attendance of ladies present.

\$6.00 a barrel was asked for Northern spire and \$5.00 for second.
Despite the fact that potatoes are being retailed at lower prices, tubers sold at \$2.00 to \$2.25 a bag.
Butter and eggs sold at 60 and 65 cents respectively.
\$25 was the price of hay.
