Can there be a more affecting picture of the fulfilment of a Mission than in the following letter from Mr. Sanderson in relation to Goodbee.

Extract of a letter from the Rev. Daniel Sanderson, dated Bangalore, November 23d, 1854.

I visited to Toomkoor and Goodbee.

Mr. Hutcheon and I set out from Bangalore last week in a two-wheeled conveyance, with bullocks posted along the road. When twenty-two miles had been crossed, we crossed the bank of a lake, one of our bullocks suddenly broke in pieces, prostrating us helpless upon the road. We wrote a note to the Amildar of Nellammas, and six miles distant, who promptly and kindly lent us a new coach for the rest of the journey, and sent a number of people to assist us. After a delay of some hours, we arrived in the heat of the day without shelter, a strong and unhealthy north-east wind blowing, from which house we proceeded, and reached Toomkoor late at night. Next day, Sunday, the 11th,

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turned into shape; the traders were not to have been sold. O Sir, the temple ought not to have been sold. You must never rest until we have a temple again." It was most moving; and we here and there, it is true, replied that, if it be possible, we will have a temple again; the glory of which shall far surpass the glory of the former. Fifty or sixty persons were present. Can you not find some one to help us? The reproach of the Heathen lies upon us. The hearts of our own children are discouraged. Thawing are confirmed in Heathenism as the wavering our first and steadfast convert with the sun. I have brought upon himself re-establishing Christianity. We ought at once to re-establish the Mission on a solid footing; and, in Daniel (the Mission, "not only plant the saplings, but dig the ground round them, and water them daily, till the trees spring up on every hand and the forest of the people. A SWORD FOR GEN. WILLIAMS.—The House of Assembly of Nova Scotia did itself do the Province the honor, on Saturday last, voting the sum of one hundred and fifty guineas for the purchase of a suitable sword to be presented to our distinguished countryman, Major General Williams, who, since the fall of the Mexican fortress which he so heroically defended is a respected prisoner of war in the Russian dominions. The resolution was moved by Hon. Attorney General, supported by the Hon. James W. Johnston, seconded by the Hon. Provincial Secretary, and sustained by the *unanimous* vote of the Assembly. The eulogium pronounced in the House, on the occasion, was alike creditable to those who uttered them, as honourable to the gallant soldier whose career and captivity formed a theme for their eloquence. You will observe the remote and loose connection which exists between the establishment of a Savings Bank system, and the power of constructing public works calculated to promote the development of the resources of the Province, and I am well assured that in the consideration of any scheme for the formation of works of this description involving the expenditure of capital beyond the annual increase of the Province, you will be made aware of the necessity of making full and ample provision for securing both for the present
