Acadia Seminary Notes.

Never before in the history of Acadia Seminary have so many applications from prospective students been received. Present indications are that the Residence will be taxed to its utmost and that provision must be made for additional accommodation. The Principal has already received 110 applications and more are on the way. The immediate constituency of the School in Wolfville and the county will rejoice in these indications of prosperity and enlarging usefulness.

The teaching staff, depleted by the retirement of several teachers whose loss was keenly felt, has finally been completed. Mrs. Redden, so well and favorably known in Wolfville, will assume the important post of Vice-principal. The other new appointments are as follows: Alice Bacon Plympton, A. B., Radcliffe, English Language and Literature; Blanche L. Crafts, one of the most gifted violinists ever graduated from N. E. Conservatory, a teacher and an artist of several years experience will take Miss Paulsen's place in violin; Miss Evelyn Schwartz, is the new head of the department of oratory; Miss Schwartz is a young woman of fine personality, a favorite on the platform, an inspiring and enthusiastic teacher. Miss Crafts and Miss Schwartz will make an extended concert tour during the Christmas recess. Miss Susan Avery, a graduate of the M. N. A. S., will be a strong substitute for Miss Richardson. Mrs. Perry Woodworth becomes first lady assistant in pianoforte. Mrs. Woodworth's work is so well known that this appointment will meet with instant approval.

All the other teachers remain as last year. The principal is confident that the staff as thus constituted cannot be duplicated for efficiency in the Maritime Provinces.

Obituaries.

The death of one of Wolfville's oldest and most estimable residents took place on Friday morning last, when Mrs. Nancy Elder Fitch, relict of the late Charles W. Fitch, passed away at the ripe age of 84 years. Mrs. Fitch was formerly Miss Nancy Elder, a native of Truro, but spent most of her early life in Hantsport, until her marriage. The family was a large and prominent one, but now two sisters only remain—Mrs. Irene Elder Martineau, of Hantsport, the well known poet, and Mrs. D. F. Harris, of Boston. The former was present at the funeral. The late Dr. William Elder, the first professor of science at Acadia, and sheriff of Colby, was a brother. Mrs. Fitch leaves behind a large circle of friends, including—William Fitch, of Virden, Manitoba, and Charles S. Fitch, of this town; and three daughters, Mrs. Andrew Jack, of Halifax, Mrs. Alice Grant, teacher at Acadia Seminary, and Miss Annie Fitch, who resides at home. The funeral service was held on Sunday afternoon from the late residence of the deceased, a large number being present to pay the last tribute of respect to a most lovable Christian lady. In the absence of the pastor, Rev. E. D. Webber, of the Baptist church, of which she was a most consistent member, Rev. A. C. Chate, D. D., conducted the solemn service. Appropriate music was given by a quartet, Messrs. Godfrey and DeWitt and Mrs. Sleep and Miss DeWitt. The pall bearers were Dr. J. F. Tufts, Dr. McKenna, C. R. H. Starr, and Rev. Howard Hars.

The death occurred in the hospital at Salda, California, on Thursday, of last week of Professor Warren M. Steele, son of Rev. Dr. Steele, of Amherst. Prof. Steele was graduated at Acadia in the class of '02. While here he was a good student and generally popular. During the past three years his health has been a source of anxiety to his many friends, he having contracted tuberculosis about that time. Since then he has spent considerable time at Richmond, Virginia, Denver, Colorado, and at his old home in Amherst, making a manly fight against the disease. For some time he has been feeling comparatively improved until on the previous Sunday when a sudden change for the worse took place.
