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regime, that the resulting figures are of little value for statistical purposes.

To take an illustration of a further difficulty, Canada gave United States a concession on oranges, removing the duty for four months of the year. It will be seen that oranges cannot be included among the items bound to the Free List, for instance, since the concession is not for the entire year. Similarly, to indicate that the reduction on oranges amounted to 100% would be equally erroneous.

There have been so many factors of this type in connection with tables of Canadian imports that few of such figures have been mentioned. At the same time it was felt that from the point of view of the defense of the Agreement it would be wiser to stress the changes in the Canadian tariff as concessions to Canadian consumers, rather than as concessions to United States exporters. The justification for such reductions may be seen in many cases, such as item 427 of the Canadian Tariff.

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
