GRAHAM PUDDING THE STANDARD EVERYDAY PUDDING.—Stir slowly into fast-boiling water, sprinkled from the hand, sufficient Graham flour to make a thin pudding. Let it boil five or ten minutes, and it is done. If set away from the fire a few minutes before taking up, it will cleave readily from the kettle, leaving it more easily to be washed. Very much depends on the manner of making; as from the same materials a most delicious dish may be made, or one not fit to eat.

The pudding left from one meal is allowed to cool in the table pudding dish—generally an oval dish—and inverted on a platter of some form, for next meal. Any of this that may be left can be dissolved in the water in which the next pudding is to be made, and so made over, or, a better way is to brown slices of it on a griddle.
