And being returned;

Mr. Speaker reported, that the House had attended upon His Excellency the Governor in Chief, with their Address, to which His Excellency was pleased to make the following answer:

Gentlemen of the House of Affembly,

The sentiments contained in your Address, are worthy of the representatives of a loyal, brave and enlightened people, and demand my warmest acknowledgements.

The approbation you have been pleased to express, of the measures I have adopted for the safety and welfare of the Province, is highly flattering to me. Should those measures be attended, as I trust they will, under the blessing of Divine Providence, with a favourable result, I shall be, in no small degree, indebted for it, to the liberal aid and prompt assistance you have at all times afforded me.

I receive, with great fatisfaction, the affurance of your future support, and anticipate from it, the accomplishment of, what I can truly say, both my duty and inclination have made the incessant object of my endeavours; the safety and prosperity of this valuable portion of His Majesty's Dominions.

On motion of Mr. Gauvreau, seconded by Mr. Bernier,

- ORDERED, That one hundred copies of the Journals of this House, for the present Session, be printed in the English and French languages, for the use of the Members of this House, under the direction of Mr. Speaker.
- ORDERED, That the said Journals be printed by such person as shall be licensed by Mr. Speaker, and that no other person do presume to print the same.

The order of the day for the House to resolve into Committee on the Ordinance for quartering the Troops upon certain occasions in the country parishes, and providing for the conveyance of effects belonging to Government, being read;
