Exports Last Year the Largest Since Confederation.

In the Aggregate the Country's Trade in 1896 Was the Best in the History of the Tariff Matters-Dr. Borden May Resign Hugh John Macdonald May Leave Federal for Provincial Politics-The Famine Fund Growing-General News

From Ostawa.

Ottawa. Feb. 22.-(Special.)-The trade and navigation returns, issued o-day, show total exports valued at \$121.013.852, the largest total export since Confederation. The increase over the previous year was \$7,500,000. The imports were valued at \$18,011,580, an increase of seven and a quarter milions over the previous year, but lower than any year of the five preceding. The grand asgressie trade for the year amounted to \$250,020,300, an increase of \$14,00,000 over the preceding year, and certainly the best year for trade in the history of the Dominion.

The blue book snows a remarkable hange in Canada's trade with Great ritain and the united States respec ively. Away back in the eighties out exports to the neighboring republic of-ten exceeded those to the Old Country. During the last three or four years, showever, our exports to Great Britain have, speaking generally, been 50 per cent. greater than to the United States.
Last year, for instance, the value of exports to Great Britain was \$66,680,288, and to the United States \$44,448,410, chiefly in raw material. In imports for home consumption the United States, however, is still ahead of the Mother Country. From Great Britain the value was \$32,979,742, and from the States \$58,574,084. Trade with France shows a slight increase, due perhaps to the operations of the French treaty, but still the total trade with France is a mere bagatelle as cent, greater than to the United States

French treaty, but still the total trade with France is a mere bagatelle as compared with other countries. The exports to France are valued at only \$581,540, an increase of a quarter of a million. With Germany, Spain, Portugal, Italy and Holland, trade continues about the same. To Belgium our exports have fallen to the sum of \$98,031; with Newfoundland our exports have with Newfoundland our exports have decreased to the tune of half a million. and are now back to the figures of 1892. Promi es Ottawa, Feb. 22 .- (Special.) -- The Excutive of the Dominion Board of Railway Employes had a lengthy confer ence with Mr. Laurier and Mr. Blair this afternoon when the question of investigating the charges of political partisanship preferred against certain Intercolonial Ranway empolyes was discussed. The delegation included A. B. Hudson, chairman; A. B. Lowe, secretary; W. King, W. H. Hood and J. Litle. It is not generally known that the Government had appointed Mr. ised dovernment had appointed air. isedard, barrister of Quebec, to investigate a few cases of alleged partisansing. Since the last meeting of the Executive with Mr. Laurier, secretary Lowe has visited Moncton and explained to the railway unions the Government's intention to appoint Mr. Bedard to investigate and account of the control dard to investigate an charges and railway men ar favorable to him. The railway emp yes desired the Government to appoint two commissioners, but will be satisfied with one. The de-putation pointed out that the matter had been allowed to drift long enough and expected a speedy reply to their request. If the government decided not to cause an investigation into different charges the grand officers of the several railway orders will be called together and trouble might result. After these representations the Min-ister of Railways and the Premier conslight increase in each case.

Ordinary conver-sation into which men might be drawn. not at a public meeting, or interchange of opinion at to the merits of a party, a policy or a candidate, shall not be strained to be partisanship, and all charges made under this head shall be charges made under this head shall be investigated by an officer of the road the same as any other charges would. Investigation into an employe's conduct politically shall not go further back than the last general election. That is from the time of the issuing of the writs for said election.
