RUSSIANS TAKE THE OFFENSIVE

Great German Drive Toward Przemysl Believed to Have Spent Itself.

London, June 1.—The great battle on the San, to which the Russians fell back after retreating over half of Galicia, still rages, but the Russians assert that they have assumed the offensive. The statement is taken in London to mean that another mighty German effort has expended itself. Though the fate of Przemysl is still uncertain, it is contended that the Austro-Germans have failed of their purpose to crush the Russians in Galicia, and that their rush forward, costing as it did, thousands of lives, has fallen short, just as did the repeated thrusts at Warsaw and Lodz.

The official announcement issued last night by the Austrian war office makes no claim of any noteworthy advances in the east, dismissing the Przemysl region with the brief declaration that "the fighting continues," and asserting that there have been no serious engagements elsewhere on the eastern front.

The Russians, on the other hand, claim victories at many points on the front, and state that the battle in the Przemysl district is developing favorably. On the whole San front they successfully assumed the offensive on Sunday night, while the German offensive, easterly from Jaroslau has been stopped by the Russian fire. All hostile attacks have been repulsed in the trans-Dniester region, towards Bukovina, where a resolute offensive was assumed by the Russians on Saturday night resulting in the capture of over 7,000 prisoners and 30 quick-firing guns. The enemy, the report states, has begun a disorderly retreat on this front.

It is also announced in the Petrograd statement that nearly 10,000 prisoners were taken by the Russians between May 12 and May 24 in the fighting between the Plika and the upper Dniester in Southern Poland.

The Austrian official report, issued in Vienna yesterday says: "On the San and to the east no serious fighting occurred yesterday. Fighting continues on the northern and west-west parts of the Przemysl district and on the upper Dniester. In the region of Stry the Austro-German troops, in the course of heavy fighting, captured several positions and a Russian battery. The situation in the North-east is unchanged."

"SHELTER" DESTROYED.

By Special Wire to the Courier. London, June 1.—A despatch to the News from Mytilene dated Sunday, says: "An enemy submarine shelter was discovered in the vicinity of Availi, on the west coast of Asia Minor, to which place British warships proceeded to-day. Sixty shots have since been heard coming from that vicinity, leading to the belief that its full work has been accomplished."

PROMOTER IS DEAD.

By Special Wire to the Courier. St. Louis, Mo., June 1.—George D. Barnard, founder of a skin and cancer hospital here, to which he gave \$200,000, and former president of the Merchants' Exchange, died here yesterday from tuberculosis of the bladder. He was 69 years old. Mr. Barnard was one of the original promoters of the St. Louis World's Fair.

NEWS OFFICE WRECKED

By Special Wire to the Courier. Sapulpa, Okla., June 1.—The building in which the Sapulpa Herald is located, was wrecked by an explosion of dynamite last night. Fire which spread rapidly was soon checked. The Herald has been waging a fight against lawless elements. Officials have started an investigation.

BIG COAL SHIPMENT

By Special Wire to the Courier. Pittsburgh, June 1.—A shipment of 150 barges loaded with 1,750,000 bushels of coal left here yesterday for southern markets, following the second rise of the local rivers to a barge state within a week. Other shipments will be made to-day and river men hope to clear the harbor before the river recedes. About seven millions bushels were sent south at the time of the previous rise.

A RARE BLESSING

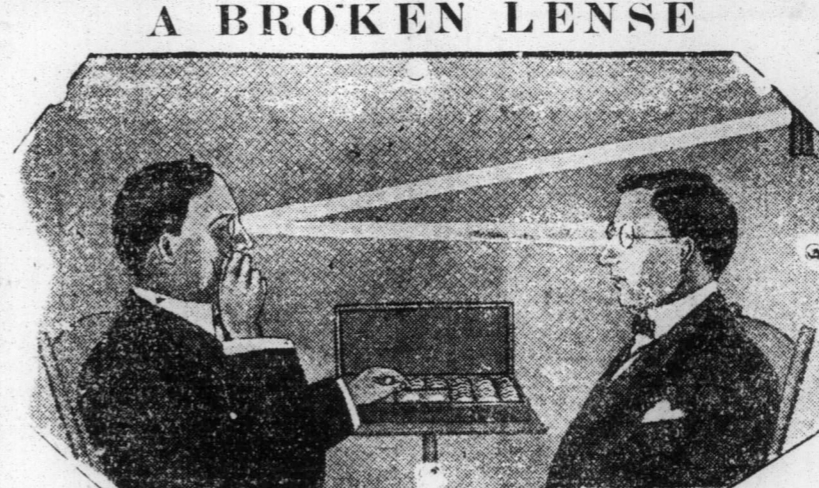

OFFICERS' LISTS ARE LARGE

By Special Wire to the Courier. LONDON, May 20.—Correspondence—Officers' casualty statements for the fortnight ended May 17 show that losses in the British army were heavier than during any period of the war, there being 423 killed, 1067 wounded and 137 missing—a total of 1627 during the fortnight.

Some regiments suffered very severely, the Indians losing 33 killed and 111 wounded; Canadians, 21 killed, 25 wounded and 40 missing; Australians, 10 wounded; New Zealanders, 10 killed, 23 wounded; Yorkshire regiment, 16 killed, 50 wounded; London County, 14 killed, 23 wounded; Royal Field Artillery, 17 killed, 52 wounded; Lancashire Regiment, 34 killed, 72 wounded; Seaford Highlanders, 7 killed, 23 wounded; while many others had losses of over 20.

Brigadier-General Lowry-Cole died of wounds, while one colonel and ten lieutenant-colonels were killed.

Since the beginning of the war 2,669 officers have been killed, 5,244 wounded, while 899 are reported missing. This is a total of 8,812.
