Ladysmith, Tuesday, April 10.—The Boers opened fire this morning early, sending shells into the British camp at Elandslaagte from three positions widely separated. The shells did no damage. BRABANT AT WEPENER.

Press despatche make it clear that there has been fighting for two days at Wepener, where Gen. Brabant with the colonial forces has been attacked by three Boer commandoes with sev-eral guns. The result of Monday's artillery practice was favorable to the colonial troops, but yesterday's attack was more severe and determined. Gen. Brabant's forces are reported to be well supplied with provisions and ammunition and in occupation of a strong position. The Basutos are greatly ex-cited by Boer operations on the edge of their territory, and it is most difficult for the British agent to hold them unfor the British agent to hold them under restraint. The nearest point garrisoned by British troops is Aliwal North, but Wegener is apparently isolated and completely surrounded by the Boers. There is no confirmation of the report that a large Boer force is marching towards Springfontein, and there is no proof that the railway and there is no proof that the railway or telegraphic communication has been broken south of Bloemfontein.

LORD ROBERTS PLANS. New York, April 11.—A despatch to the Tribune from London says: By the grace of the censor the military situation is confusing, but it is not an unintelligible maze. The British inaction in the Free State and Natal is not caused by an impasse like that resulting at Chieveley, Modder River and Stormberg from the reverses of December. It is a halt rendered necessary by a systematic preparation for an irresistible movement into the Transvaal. Lord Roberts and Gen. Buller will advance when transport and equipment are in readiness, and will operate simultaneously and not be diverted from their goals by attempts of Boer raiders to scatter their forces.

This is the view of close observers in touch with the war office, who assert that the British communications are that the British communications are not in danger, and that the offensive operations against the railway lines are not serious. They add that Lord Roberts will pay as little heed to the raiders in the stanthern and eastern districts of the Free State as he did to the Dutch operations around Colesberg at the opening of his campaign; but will strike northward toward his ownjobjective point with the centainty that the field south of Bloemfontein will be cleared by his own advance. 
