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QUITE FITTINGLY

Was Father Andrieux' Jubilee
Celebrated at Pain Court.

The Popular Priest Receives Many
Congratulations—Who Were
There

The festivities in connection with the celebration of the jubilee anniversary of the entry of Father Andrieux into the priesthood, opened on Wednesday evening at Pain Court. Bishop McEvay had been in Tilbury during the day, and in the afternoon visited Father Lusselle, at Big Point. About seventy-five men on horseback from Pain Court met the Bishop and escorted him to that town, arriving there about 6 o'clock. At 7 o'clock a procession formed at the presbytery and marched to the church. The school children all dressed in white led the parade, and they were followed by about 50 of the clergy, the jubilarian, Father Andrieux and the Bishop. At the church, which had been gaily decorated with lanterns, flags, and autumn foliage, an immense throng had assembled to witness the evening's ceremonies. The school children sang a number of festive songs. The clergy and the Pain Court church choir sang a song of thanksgiving. After the song, two little girls, the children of Mr. Sheff and Mr. Thibodeau, presented the Bishop and Father Andrieux with handsome bouquets. Mrs. Borden, of Windsor, read an address and presented Father Andrieux with a gold-encrusted cane.

Mr. Belanger read an address from the congregation of Pain Court church and presented the jubilarian with a set of gold church vestments. The Rev. Fr. St. Cyr, of Stoney Point, on his own behalf, read an address. The Rev. Fr. Flannery, of Windsor, read an address from the clergy and presented Father Andrieux with a very valuable gold chalice, the gift of his fellow priests.

Bishop McEvay then arose and addressed the jubilarian and the congregation. In the course of his remarks the Bishop announced to the congregation that he had made Father Andrieux one of his counselors, and gave him the brief of archdeacon of the diocese.

After the Bishop had finished, Father Andrieux thanked the congregation and the clergy for their many acts of kindness and evidences of love and friendship.

Afterward, in the churchyard, the remainder of the evening was spent in a general gathering. Fireworks gave a pleasant ending to the festive occasion.

THURSDAY MORNING

A thanksgiving service was held. At 10 o'clock a procession formed at the presbytery and marched to the church. The clergy and the Bishop. They met the jubilarian at the church entrance and escorted him within. At the service Bishop McEvay was assisted by the Rev. Father Edward, V. G. of St. Thomas, and Rev. Dr. Cushing, of Sandwich. Father Andrieux celebrated the thanksgiving high mass, and was assisted by Father Babet, Ridge-town, and Father Parent, of Macgregor. Father Furling, of Windsor, acted as censor bearer. Rev. Father Downie, of Logan, and Rev. Father Beaudou, of Walkerville, acted as masters of ceremonies. The preacher of the day was Rev. Father St. Cyr, of Stoney Point.

Father Andrieux is the oldest priest in the diocese. He was born in France and ordained under Bishop Pinsonneault. He has served under the Bishops, Bishop Walsh, Bishop O'Connor and Bishop McEvay. During the 50 years of his service Father Andrieux has seen many changes. In the early days, when the roads were a trail through the woods, he endured many vicissitudes and made many sacrifices while administering to his flock. Now, however, in his old age, he has an easier life.

The choir of St. Joseph's were lunched in splendid style at the presbytery.
