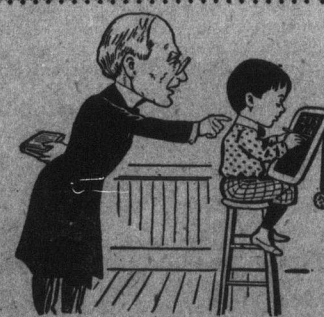
Musical Treat.—The famous Schubert Symphony Club, of Chicago, under auspices General Hospital, Opera House, Wednesday, September 11th.
