The Baptist Convention of the Maritimes, in an article on the prominent part taken by the Canadians at the Baptist Young People's Union Convention in that city, says: "The Canadian speaks this year maintained the high record made by their predecessors through the thirteen year's history of the Union." Dr. Trotter's address on "Christian Education" Thursday evening, and the consecration sermon preached on the day by Rev. John McNeill, pastor of the First Church, Winnipeg, are generally admitted to be the finest production of the convention.

The Annual Exhibition at Winnipeg is rapidly coming to the front as one of the most attractive Fairs throughout the Dominion. Manitoba and the Canadian Northwest are making wonderful progress in every way. The tremendous rush of settlers to the Western Prairies from the United States as well as from Great Britain and the Continent is rapidly filling up the territory around Winnipeg, and last year saw an increase of something like fifteen thousand in population of this thriving Western town, and this year they anticipate an increase of at least twenty thousand, which should give them a population of something over eighty thousand.

The coming of the famous English musical comedy, "The Silver Slipper," with one hundred people, its special orchestra and magnificent cast and production—the largest indoor amusement attraction in America, should prove as great a revelation of amusement history in Eastern Canada as the coming of the Great Barnum and Bailey show. Every city, town and hamlet in Nova Scotia, Prince Edward's Island, Cape Breton, New Brunswick, Quebec and Ontario, will be thoroughly advertised for the various engagements in the Dominion. This will be the first time that a truly big and gigantic American attraction has ever been seen in the Maritime Provinces.

The automobile has evidently taken a permanent place among vehicles for man's use. Even in Wolfville they have become a very usual sight on our streets. The objection to them that they frighten horses and thus interfere with traffic gradually passes away as the animals become accustomed to the sight of the strange "horseless carriage." Those who have had the privilege of driving in them readily account for their popularity. Through the courtesy of Mr. D. K. Munro, who is the promoter here of this carriage, we had a drive of some miles in his machine one day recently. The sensation is a most delightful one, and the rate of speed attained without the slightest discomfort is wonderful. The steepest hills, even when the road was rough and sandy, were taken with perfect ease, the driver at all times having the carriage under complete control. Mr. Munro has already driven his machine nearly a thousand miles and has never so far found it necessary to dismount to make any repair or change while on the road.

Canadian Story-Writers. Beach Echoes.

There are thousands of people who should appreciate Canadian stories because they are Canadian, yet are quite unfamiliar with the names of Canadian story-writers. The July "Canadian Magazine" contains at least three stories of leaders in this class of literature. There is a racing story by W. A. Fraser, who is the author of several books, and a resident of Georgetown, a small town just west of Toronto. There is a humorous tale by A. R. Carman, a staff writer on the Montreal Star, the author of two novels, and a descriptive writer of considerable experience. The western story, "Star-Blanket," is by Duncan Campbell Scott, an officer in the Department of Indian Affairs at Ottawa, and the author of some volumes of verse of more than ordinary merit. It is pleasant to know that it is possible for a magazine editor to secure stories by native writers fully equal to those produced elsewhere in the Anglo-Saxon world. This number contains also some articles of exceptional interest, including "The Ladies' Empire Club of London," by Lily Bernard; "An Outing on the Bay of Fundy's Shore," by E. C. Sears; a character sketch of Richard McBride, Premier of British Columbia, by T. A. Gregg; and "How Our Grandfathers Lived," by Frank Veigh. All these contributions are appropriately illustrated. Special attention is also given to summer books. The colored frontispiece is an attractive bit of Canadian scenery.

The two great political parties in the United States have now elected their candidates for the Presidency and Vice-presidency. President Roosevelt and Senator Fairbanks of Indiana represent the choice of the Republican party, and Judge Alton B. Parker of New York State, and Henry G. Davis, of West Virginia, that of the Democrats. The national convention of the Democrats, held in St. Louis last week, showed much less unanimity in the choice of a candidate than did the Republican convention two weeks earlier in Chicago. Eight candidates in all were nominated. In spite of an anti-Parker speech from W. J. Bryan, which is described as electrifying, it was found on the first ballot that Judge Parker had nearly enough votes to secure his nomination, and as several other States came quickly to his support his nomination was placed beyond doubt. A motion to make the nomination unanimous was then moved and carried. Judge Parker is a Democrat of the Cleveland type and as such stands for the best traditions of his party. His character and record appear to be such as to justify the belief that if elected he would make a very respectable President. The probability of his being elected however is small. President Roosevelt is popular with the nation, and though there are some of the party leaders who would have preferred another candidate, he will doubtless command the strength and enthusiasm of his party as a whole, whereas it seemed certain that all Judge Parker can hope for from a considerable section of his party is a lukewarm support. The Prohibitionists have also nominated three candidates—Silas C. Swallow, of Pennsylvania, as President and George W. Carroll, of Texas, Vice-President. In addition to its declaration in favor of Prohibition, the Prohibitionist platform declares in favor of international arbitration, uniform laws for the country and its dependencies, popular election of Senators, the initiative and referendum and a number of other reforms.
