

DISTRICT MATTERS.

GALT.

The changes in Galt Collegiate Institute consequent upon the resignation of Dr. Tait are quite sweeping. Mr. Murray, Mathematical master, Mr. O'Connell, Language, Mr. Macdonald, English, and Miss Allen, principal of the ladies' department, have all resigned their positions.

Galt fair on Wednesday last week was but sparsely attended by cattle, butchers and drovers uniting in the statement that cattle for killing were scarce.

41 sheep brought by Messrs. McKillop & Irving, brought \$10, and \$90 each in England.

A \$5,000 addition is to be made to the Queen's Hotel.

W.S. Stanley for several years in charge of the Dundas knitting factory, has been appointed manager of the Galt knitting factory.

The storm of Tuesday week did considerable damage at Drayton. A portion of the roof of the shedingrick was blown off, the judges' stand and grand stand in fair ground were blown down, and one of the chimneys on the Methodist parsonage was damaged, while a section had their roofs removed or were otherwise damaged.

FERGUS.

A panic was caused at Fergus the other day by a report that the *Ozark* from which John Black had shipped a cargo of cattle and by which several Fergus people took passage had been lost at sea. To the relief of all concerned word of the safe arrival of the steamer proved the falsity of the report.

Mr. James Sigmund, formerly of West Gairnra, who for about two years and six months past has been at his old home in Scotland, arrived back in Fergus the other day, accompanied by a wife whom he married since he went away, and two relatives who came out with them.

Dr. Joseph Carbert, of Orangeville, has been appointed jail surgeon for the new County of Dufferin.

Mr. Joe. Davidson, of Toronto, sold recently 25,000 acres of land and several mills and dwelling-houses situated at Thunder Bay to Mr. W. H. Carpenter, of Kincardine, for \$100,000.

Meaford rejoices in the possession of a centenarian in the person of Mr. F. Bourcier, who reached the ripe age of 105 on the 29th ult. Mr. B. engaged in the British service during the war of 1811-15 with the United States, worked on a farm till over 80 years ago, and since that time has resided in Meaford.

The directors of the S. & H. R. R. intend having the iron laid to Winton in time to take off this year's crops.

The G. W. R. have purchased the right of way, and will shortly have a number of men engaged in strengthening the road east of Drayton and building a permanent bridge over the Conestoga river.

Mr. J. A. Carbert, P. L. S., D. L. S., of Orangeville, has again been appointed by the Dominion Government to lay out townships in the North West. A portion of his party went from Fergus, and is made up of Jas. Philip, J. Parker, Smellie, Orton, Grant, Donald McLean, Jr., Thos. Hayes, Henry Kelly, and Willard Griffith.

The Clifford fair last week was largely attended, and a good number of sales were reported.

A horse fair was held at Arthur last week, which was well attended by both buyers and sellers. Quite a number of good horses changed hands at fair prices.

Crops throughout the county of Peel are poor.

The township of Protton, seems to have suffered less from the recent frosts than any of the surrounding townships.

SUDDEN DEATH AT ALEX.—An inquest was held on Saturday the 25th ult., by Coroner Dr. Page, on the remains of the late James Johnston, for many years hotel keeper in the village of Alex. Deceased was in his usual health on Friday, was about the house during the day, ate his meals heartily, and gave his family no cause for alarm. Between six and seven o'clock in the evening he added one more glass of whiskey to the many drank during the day, and immediately fell on the floor. He was assisted to the foot of the stairs, but for want of help could not be carried to bed. He sat upon the floor, his right arm resting on the first step, his head on his arm. Here he was allowed to sleep, as he had often done before, from seven to nine o'clock, at which hour his son and an assistant went to take him upstairs to bed, and found him dead. At the inquest it was concluded that death was caused by an overdose of intoxicating liquor, and was accelerated by heart disease.
