It is stated on good authority that the law permits a woman to run for and to occupy a seat in parliament. If no other candidates come up, and Mrs. Adney persists, she will nail a surprising number of votes.

Mrs. Robert Squires

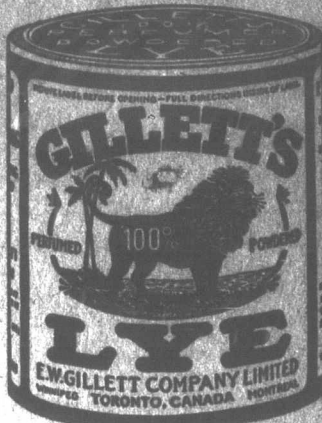
