



PAROLED CROOK  
MAY BE AN EARL"Earl of Dunblane" Leaves  
Michigan State Prison  
Under Conditions.

Detroit, Mich., Feb. 27.—A. J. War-  
ner, the self-styled Earl of Dunblane,  
convicted in 1922 on a charge of sell-  
ing stock in a Detroit casualty com-  
pany and keeping the proceeds, has  
left his job on the coal pile at the  
Michigan State Prison at Jackson and  
gone back to Canada to mingle with  
nobility, Governor Grosbeck announ-  
ced yesterday.

Governor Grosbeck granted Warner  
a parole, but not upon the recommen-  
dations of the prison authorities who  
reported as follows:

"Conduct bad, record bad; has been  
repeatedly punished."  
The Governor created the vacancy  
in the coal heaver squad because it  
was learned that Mr. Warner prob-  
ably is an earl after all. O. L. Smith,  
Assistant Attorney General, who in-  
vestigated the case, stated that War-  
ner probably is a real Earl.

It has been established, he says,  
that Warner's mother was related to  
an Earl. At least two public officials  
of Canada were interested in the case  
and asked for a parole, one reason  
being that Warner had several child-  
ren in Toronto, who needed his assis-  
tance. A condition of his parole is that  
he stay out of the United States for  
all time. He agreed to do so. It is  
understood that Warner already has  
left the prison and is now in Toronto.

Near Cheboygan the Earl acquired  
an elaborate country estate from a  
former lumberman and proclaimed  
himself to be his stationery. The  
Assistant Attorney General says an  
examination of Burke's Peerage shows  
that this was the McGregor crest. Not  
that of Dunblane.

The records in the office of the  
Commissioner of Pardons and Paroles  
for Michigan indicate that besides in-  
fringements of laws in financial deals,  
the earl is charged among other  
things with violating the Volstead Act  
and Michigan prohibition laws.

TURK CAMPAIGN  
AGAINST KURDS


Ismet Pasha Will Lead the  
Turkish Forces Against  
Enemy.

Constantinople, Feb. 27.—The Turk-  
ish military operations against the  
rebels under Shukr Said in Kurdistan,  
will, it is reported be directed by  
General Ismet Pasha, or Kemal Eddine  
Pasha. The government has ordered  
a partial mobilization in Anatolia.  
Calling up reserves in the vilayets  
bordering on the rebel area.  
A circular issued by the insurgent's  
appeals to the population in the fol-  
lowing words:

"Your call awaits you. No mo-  
hammedanism is possible without the  
Caliphate. The present government  
is opposed to religion."

The Kurdish rebels are reported to  
have proclaimed Prince Selim, son of  
the former Sultan, Abdul Hamid, as  
king of Kurdistan. Prince Selim may  
be the "Caliph" referred to in the  
circular issued by the insurgents.

## Claims Upheld

SEVERE STORMS IN  
NORTHERN ONTARIORailway Trains Delayed by  
Heavy Drifts—Some  
Accidents.

North Bay, Ont., Feb. 27.—One of  
the most severe snow storms of the  
winter is raging over Northern On-  
tario, it being the third day of the  
storm in some parts. Very high  
winds drifted the snow badly yester-  
day and railway trains had trouble  
over both the Temiskaming and  
Northern Ontario Railway, and the  
National Transcontinental lines. Can-  
slightly, but this line was not as badly  
affected as the lines to the north.


Train 47 of the T. and N. O., which  
left Toronto on Wednesday night,  
was stalled in a big drift near Math-  
eson, early last evening, some seven  
hours behind schedule. When the  
National Transcontinental limited,  
also running late, failed to see sig-  
nals because of the heavy snow and  
rain, ran into the rear end of a  
stalled train, three or four passengers  
in the rear coach were shaken up.  
The coach was derailed. No one was  
badly injured, for the train was trav-  
elling slow and all were able to con-  
tinue to their homes. The coach was  
considerably damaged and some  
damage was done to the engine of  
the second train. Tracks were washed  
up until midnight, when the trains  
were able to proceed.

Reports from Timmins, Iroquois  
Falls, and Cochrane this morning in-  
dicate that there has been no let-up  
of the storm in the North. It has  
abated somewhat at this end but  
winds continue to drift the snow.


