BEST DAY HE HAS HAD

Harry Thaw Pleased With Yesterday's Court Proceedings.

Were Thaw's Delusions Against White Well Founded?

Dr. Austin Flint Cross-Examined by Mr. Morschauser.

day was the best day I have had yet," said Harry K. Thaw to-day, while waiting for the continuance of the hearing on his application for discharge from the State Hospital for the Criminal Insane. In spite of the fact that the state and county prosecutors consider that yesterday's evidence closed the doors of Thaw's prison tighter than ever before, the prisoner displays his accustomed confidence. Last night he spent several hours with his counsel, Charles Morschauser, preparing for his rebuttal evidence that will follow the testimony of the state alienists to-day. Thaw's attorney, it became known to-day, is getting ready to prove that his client's alleged delusions regarding Stanford White's treatment of young girls are well founded. He prepared the way for this yesterday, when he had Thaw identify the affidavit of Ada G. Dickhart. This document has not yet been offered in evidence, but around it Mr. Marschauser, it is supposed, will build up the remainder of his case after he finishes cross-examining the opposition experts.

He continued his questioning along the line this morning, with Dr. Austin Flint on the stand as the first witness. Dr. Flint yesterday asserted that Thaw was a paranoic and incurable.

Mr. Morschauser examined the witness regarding the sanity proceedings of Mrs. Penelope Osborne, in which he appeared as an expert in May, 1907. Thaw's lawyer asserts Dr. Flint's testimony resulted in this woman's discharge from restraint, although he classed her as a paranoiac.

CARTING IN THE COUNTY.

Move to Prevent City Men From Doing It.

Mr. T. F. Payne appeared at Warden age's office last night to petition the prevent city carters from carting in the township and to compel township carters to pay a license fee. Not long ago, he said, he took his stand as a carter in the city and, being summoned, was threatened with a fine if he continued to do so as he had no license and was not a resident. It was impossible, he said, for a non-resident to get a license to cart in the city, yet Mr. Payne said city carters go out into the township and take trade away from township arters without having to pay-license fees or be confined to any limits. This state of affairs he did not look upon as just, and thought the same rule which applies in the city should be made to apply in the township.

Mr. Gage informed him that no such by-law could be considered at the Board of Health meeting then in progress, but that the Council would probably take the question up at their next meeting and intimated that nothing would be done to put the ratepayers in an awkward position. They would have to be assured that ample accommodation would be given by the township carters, and possibly it might be necessary to regulate the tariff if such a by-law were passed.
