The Power of Bismark Declining.

There are some symptoms in Ger-

many that the power of Prince Bismark is declining. He has just been in an ugly quarrel with the liberal party, and is threatened with a loss of prestige. The story, as told by the Berlin correspondent of the London Daily News, is as follows: The Reichstag was summoned at a late cay this year, and the important measures of the session were even then held back. The government did not bring forward its military bill its civil marriage bill, or its new press law. The deputies became tired of waiting, and after they had lost all patience, Herr Lasker, the leader of the liberals, upbraided the government in the bitterest language for its procrastination. Bismark replied in a bad temper to Herr Lasker and to Dr. Simson, the president of the Reichstag, who had fully supported Lasker. On the other hand the Bismark party say that there was a well-understood agreement between the chancellor and the leading deputies that only the military bill should be acted upon at this session,an agreement to which both Dr. Simson and Herr Lasker were parties. They therefore say that the attempt of the liberals to have the session closed without action on that important matter is a breach of the agreement.
