About nine million dollars worth of silk from the Orient, chiefly Japanese, reached Vancouver on May 1st on two Trans-Pacific liners.

Much controversy has been going on in the press lately relative to large eggs. Now comes along a claimant from Edmonton who thinks he breaks the record. This remarkable egg was laid by a Plymouth Rock pullet. There were two shells with about half an inch of space between them filled with the same material as the white of an ordinary egg. The outside shell was about the same size as a double yolked egg, while the inner shell was the size of a normal one.

The Village of St. Boniface, St. Maurice, Quebec, was wiped out by a fierce fire on Thursday evening last. The Parish Church, the Hospital, the Bakery, the principal Stores, and private residence were all destroyed by the flames. The Lighting and Telephone systems were put out of order and the hamlet is in darkness except from an occasional flare from the smouldering ruins. This was the intelligence on Thursday night.

Jewels that at one time belonged to the late Cardinal Newman, which had been stolen from the Cardinal's former residence have been recovered by the police of Birmingham. A man named Taylor was being tried at Smithwick on a charge of housebreaking, and when the police were searching his home for evidence against him the jewels were found. There were six articles in the lot, a gold amethyst ring bearing a Latin inscription, a gold watch chain and pendant and three old fashioned seals, one of which was heavily embossed and was set with a crystal.

## Funeral of Late

Rev. Wm. Phelan

The funeral of the late Rev. William Phelan, of Sturgeon, took place there on Wednesday morning, 11th inst., at 9.30 a. m., and was one of the largest ever seen in that part of the country, people of all denominations from far and near, as well as deceased's own parishioners, being present, while almost all the clergy of the diocese took part in the service. Rev. Alex. McAulay was the celebrant, with Rev. Father McGuigan as deacon and Rev. M. J. Smith sub-deacon, and Rev. Maurice McDonald master of ceremonies. His Lordship Bishop O'Leary was present in cape and mitre, assisted by Rev. Mgr. McLean and Rev. Dr. McLellan of St. Dunstan's University. His Lordship delivered an appropriate funeral oration. The remains were laid to rest in the vault beneath the Church which the deceased had erected.

## Death of Mrs.

J. J. Curran

The many friends of Mrs. J. J. Curran will hear with regret of her death, which occurred May 14th, at her late residence, 388 Jeanne Mance Street. The end came suddenly after a somewhat protracted illness, patiently borne throughout. Always of a kind and retiring disposition Mrs. Curran had ceased to appear at public functions since the death of her husband; yet she followed the affairs of the country with a keen and patriotic interest.

She leaves eight children to mourn her loss, of whom seven are resident in this city: Charles K. Curran, F. J. Curran, K. C. L. E. Curran, D. O. C. Curran and the Misses May, Rachel and Flora Curran. Dr. T. J. J. Curran, now residing in Manchester, was M. D. for the Manchester Fusiliers in the Great War, while D. O. C. Curran was the commanding officer of No. 1 Construction Battalion of Canada.
