OFFICIAL REPORT ON WORLD'S CROISS

Conditions in Canada are Pronounced to Be Flattering.

Washington, July 18.—Official reports of foreign crops received by the department of agriculture and announced today indicate that general favorable conditions existed abroad during June. The conditions in Canada are over most of the territory pronounced flattering.

In the spring wheat provinces, Saskatchewan, Manitoba and Alberta the increase in area amounted to 2,000,000 acres. Every acre of wheat went into the ground the spring wheat lands have been saturated by the heavy rains and some exceptions favored by forcing culture.

In Europe winter wheat and rye on the whole have fully maintained their former promise. The wheat crop of the United Kingdom on an increased area is regarded likely to furnish an average yield. France with diminished area under both wheat and rye, promises a medium out turn for the former and a less satisfactory of the latter.

Spain is reported to have exceptional crops, the official estimate of putting wheat at 12,000,000 bushels a high mark. The crop of Germany is probably not quite to the usual standard and rye is expected to show a considerable shortage.

The Hungarian wheat crop is officially estimated at 12,000,000 bushels and rye at 5,000,000 bushels. In Roumania and the Balkan states the prospects are much better than in average years.

In Russia there is much conflict of opinion, the weight of public opinion seems, however, to be in medium results. In Italy better yields than last year are anticipated but heavy rains may later show their effects on the quality. In Argentina the newly sown wheat, oats and flax seed are doing well. The moisture in the soil is believed to have been increased. Popular opinion predicts a surface under wheat five to ten per cent over the 1910 wheat crop sown last year. The 1910 wheat crop in Chile is reported sufficient for home needs and imports are being made from Australia. The wheat crop, the indispensable precursor of a favorable seed time on unrated soil in British India broke in full force in mid-June and heavy rains have already fallen over wide areas. Late reports, however, indicate a partial failure of the crop in some localities in the Empire.

The harvest progress on the prairie coast of America is said to promise well in Alberta. In the much less important provinces which began harvest with the extension of her military operations in northern Mexico, late reports have further intimated the feeling of offended dignity. A message from Alcazar stated that M. Goleaux, French consular agent, while returning from a stroll in the country was stopped by a Spanish patrol who attempted to take his carbine from him. The patrol conducted the agent to the Spanish barracks where he was released upon the orders of the officers in charge who said that mistake had been made but offered no apology.

Drained in Irrigation Canal. Lethbridge, July 17.—While bathing in the irrigation canal on the experimental farm Hugh Norman a young Englishman five months out from England, got beyond his depth and was drowned. The body was recovered only after five hours dragging.
