A Kindly Reference.

In dealing with the accident which deprived the two poor boys, Lloyd and Martin, of their lives last evening our morning contemporary—the News—uses these kindly words:—

"Only ten days ago Mr. P. K. Devine, of the Telegram staff, had a bright lad of sixteen years go down to death by drowning. Now Editor Lloyd of the Telegram loses a son, and book-keeper Martin, also of the Telegram, loses a nephew. On the Telegram the arrow of the Death Angel has fallen with cruel frequency of late, and with its Editor and Mr. Martin, the city mourns."

Such sympathetic sentiments coming at a moment when sorrow of the most poignant kind imbes all the members of our staff must certainly be appreciated. The funeral of both boys will take place to-morrow.

The funeral of Willie Lloyd will leave "Eccason" at 2.15, and will meet that of Herbert Martin at the residence of his father, Mr. A. H. Martin, Forest Road at 3 o'clock. Both bodies will be taken to the Mortuary Chapel together where the burial service will be held, and then they will be laid to rest side by side in the Church of England Cemetery.

The two lads, verging upon the threshold of manhood, who, in the full flush of their youthful vigour, have been called away, are sincerely mourned; but their is eternal rest. Cable News.

LONDON, Aug. 4.
Arthur Newton, the solicitor who will take charge of Dr. Crippen's case, has issued a statement regarding the matter as follows: "It seems to me upon the evidence already available that the case against the doctor is not one to discourage me in the least degree. So far as I can see there is no kind of evidence that a murder has actually been committed. I am in communication with the doctor and the statement that he has confessed is quite unfounded. I am applying to the authorities for copies of the depositions of witnesses and all other available documents. There is a great deal to be done, but it will not be necessary for me to go to Canada, although I may meet Crippen at the British port of landing."

MADRID, Spain, Aug. 4.
The Minister of the Interior in a statement regarding the religious agitation, announces that troops are ready to leave for San Sebastian at a moment's notice. The Republican leader, Senor Iorians, is arranging for an anti-clerical manifestation at San Sebastian on August 7th, the same day on which the Catholics will hold their demonstrations. Premier Canalejas has received a message of congratulation and support from 128 Andalusians, representing 80,000 workmen, agriculturists and business men.

ROME, Aug. 4.
The note which Cardinal Merry Del Val, the Papal Secretary of State, is preparing in answer to that of Premier Canalejas, will be submitted to the Congregation of Extraordinary Affairs. The contents of the note will be kept strictly secret, the Holy See not wishing to follow the procedure of the Spanish Premier in making it public prior to its receipt by the Premier. But the Vatican officials are of the opinion that it will be given out to the newspapers as soon as it arrives in Madrid. The Giornale D'Italia published an interview with Cardinal Vincenzo Vanuelli, who describes Premier Canalejas "a terrible man," adding that it is impossible that King Alfonso approves his anti-clerical policy.

BERLIN, Aug. 4.
Prince Henry of Prussia, who is a member of the Zeppelin Preliminary Arctic Expedition Party, now headed for Spitzbergen to study conditions for the proposed Zeppelin dirigible balloon expedition to the North Pole, says to-day in a message from Norway: "It is not the intention of the expedition to attempt to reach the pole before a full preliminary investigation has been made. No start by balloon will be attempted before a most complete knowledge of conditions in the ice world bearing on the success, such as the nature of the polar air, currents and the chances of landing upon the icefields, have been ascertained. It may," said the Prince, "be even 5, 10 or 15 years before the aim of the Zeppelin expedition attaining the pole by the air route will be reached. Then, too, the main object of the enterprise is scientific, not a mere pole hunt."

LAWRENCE, Mass., Aug. 4.
For twenty minutes to-night Lawrence was the centre of a small tornado. Trees by the score were blown down, houses unroofed, windows broken, electric and telephone wires blown down and the streets blocked with the debris. To add to the difficulty the city was almost in darkness.

MADRID, Aug. 4.
A renewed and formal proposition of the proposed manifestation of the clerical forces at San Sebastian next Sunday was issued to-day by the Minister of the Interior. The organizers of the demonstration nevertheless are persisting in their plans, and as the Republican leaders are arranging for anti-clerical demonstrations at San Sebastian, great apprehension prevails.

Still More Bankers.

During the past week a regular fleet of Lunenburg bankers have visited St. John's. The Mayola Wentzell, got in here this morning. She was 3 weeks at Grand Banks and secured 300 qts. of fish. After her came the bankers Parana, Lucania and Yukon, also off the Grand Banks. The Lucania has 1,300 qts. stocked to date; the Mayola, 1,900; the Parana, 1,600; and the Yukon, 1,750. All these vessels came in for bait, ice, etc.; they are being fitted out with these requirements by Job Bros.

Labrador News.

The s.s. Invermore arrived at Twillingate at 9.10 p.m. yesterday, coming south. Capt. Parsons sent this message to the Inlet Mill Co.: "Arrived at Emily Harbor Aug. the first, prevailing winds E. to S.E., thick fog all through going north. From Sugar Harbor to Smokey very little done since last report. Emily Harbor and vicinity fishery improving. At White Bears traps have from 150 to 200 qts.; boats 50 qts. and doing well. At Wolf Islands and Spotted Islands the fish is striking in.
