For that woman has used that particular style of newspaper ever since I have known her. Almost all my other correspondents have run the gamut of color and style, but she has always clung to that particular style and ornamentation, except the old English initial.

Individuality, is an even prettier custom. One's possessions should be the expression of one's personality, but with many of us, our belongings are nothing but the reflection of passing styles, the expression of some style dictator's personality, gotten together with absolutely no reference to their fitness for our particular selves, or to their own intrinsic beauty or merit. There are innumerable directions in which one can express one's personality in one's belongings. The handkerchief and the writing paper are merely illustrative suggestions. In gloves, in hairpins, in stockings, in neckwear, in countless other details of the costume and personal possessions, one may, if one wishes, have a distinctive style which shall stand for one's self, as surely as the embroidered or engraved monogram for one's name. Sidewalk Sketches.

DETROIT. Detroit is an American city with French table manners and Canadian trimmings. Its chief industry consists in knocking a 110 horse out of business, except the self-starting automobile. Detroit was formed at the home of our red brother, who spent many happy years riding the single-cylinder broncho up and down its paved streets and collecting foreign scalps. In 1910 a party of French tourists, who brought with them little save their patriotism and poll tax receipts, came over and pushed the red brother into Lake Erie so fast that he went away and left his scalp collection on the piano. From that day to this people have been leaving things in Detroit—mainly the red brother's round-shouldered checks and promissory notes in exchange for large, red automobiles. There is less walking done in Detroit than in any city the known world except Amsterdam, whose business men go down to the office clad in bathing suits and green umbrellas. The Detroit man whose automobile in his grip, heads into Detroit on business, and is promptly ground into the car tracks and sat upon by some rude motorist, is disgraced by rubber pimples. There is so much water at, in, abutting upon, adjacent to and surrounding Detroit, that its society people are no longer at the mercy of the Saturday night bath. The arrangements are very convenient, as a man can step out on his back porch and have in some salted sea, without subjecting his physique to the unfeeling comment of the common herd, or being tripped up from the rear by the undertow.

Explains Scheme

Editor Evening Telegram. Dear Sir,—May we through the columns of your valuable paper make clear some misunderstanding which arises from my article in regard to a scheme in which a good many of the ladies of St. John's are at present interested. At a meeting held in the Ladies' Reading Room, on Friday afternoon, last, a scheme was laid before those present advocating the opening of a depot where people in poor circumstances might at a low cost procure prepared food, such as soup, custard, beef tea, junket, etc., for use in their homes. It is felt that especially in homes where there is illness, it will facilitate matters, particularly in the case of those of too self-respecting and independent a spirit to desire charity. Then, too, it is thought that in many cases where the women are away at work all day, getting home too tired, if not too late, to bother about preparing a meal, it would be a great boon to be able to get some good nourishing food without the trouble of preparing it. As no one will be helped without proper investigation, it is hoped that this will reach a class of people really deserving of support. In other words, it is not a mere charity, it is an endeavour to help those who are willing to help themselves, a class generally overlooked in most charitable organizations, as they are not usually those who are in the habit of applying for help. It is further hoped that all interested in working amongst the poor in St. John's will co-operate in what is by far the most important phase of this undertaking, viz., the working out of a complete list of the cases helped. It is felt that this will prove most valuable in checking the lamentable overlapping of unorganized and promiscuous charity known to exist by those who do most visiting amongst the poor in this city. The plan is no new one, being one of the most successful points in that recognized benevolent institution, the Charity Organization Society, which has branches all over Great Britain. The United States. It is therefore clear

that properly conducted, such an organization will not be a new charity at all, but a bond of union, through which one charity may avoid overlapping the work done by another, and thus more people may be helped and more good accomplished with an expenditure of less time and money. This scheme has been found in other countries to be the only satisfactory way of regulating the distribution of charity, so as to foster the self-respect of those receiving assistance and help them to keep, or regain, their independence. The invariable experience of those who have systematically studied the subject proves that indiscriminate charity in almost all cases undermines the self-respect and independence of the recipient, and in this way often does more harm than good. The more deeply this subject is studied the more emphatic does it become that the wise distribution of charity is a most difficult problem, and that the only satisfactory way of breeding a class of professional beggars. In many cases these are able to live much better on the proceeds of their begging than is the self-respecting independent working man, who would be ashamed to ask anyone for a cent. It is hoped to hold another meeting in a later issue, of which notice will be given in the newspapers, and which all interested are invited to attend.
