LONDON, June 6.

The disaster to the Titanic has done
little to alter the views of Harold A.
Sanderson, a director of the White
Star Line, as to the sufficiency of the
present equipment of trans-Atlantic
steamers for all practical purposes.
Recalled by the Committee to-day, he
disputed the usefulness of additional
lifeboats, searchlights, binoculars,
and larger crews, but added that there
is a popular cry for binoculars and
extra boats, and we want to satisfy
it. There are certain points, he con-
tinued, which it would be impossible
to eliminate, just as there are on
land. The witness emphasized the
fact that small boats were carried
only for the purpose of transporting
persons from ship to ship, or from
ship to land. If more seamen were
carried in order to man additional
boats, they would have nothing to do
until there was a wreck. Searchlights,
he declared, would be worse than
useless. They would be a positive
source of danger. The worst thing
possible for a lookout is a glare
light. Questioned regarding the space
given up for the accommodation of
wealthy passengers, Sanderson re-
plied, if there were anything more that
we could do to ensure the safety of
passengers, millionaires' suites would
not stand in the way. He attributed
the greater loss of life among the
third class passengers of the Titanic
to the fact that the best position for
launching the boats happened to be
nearest the first and second class
quarters.

The Algerine
Returns.

The s.s. Algerine, Capt. J. Jackman,
which was chartered by the White
Star Line and despatched to the vicin-
ity where the s.s. Titanic met her
fate to make search for victims, her-
self arrived back last night. As previously
mentioned in the Telegram, the Al-
gerine found one body, that of Patrick
McGrath, a native of Dublin, and who
had been a stoker on board the big
liner. This body was picked up with
a lifebuoy on it. When hoisted aboard
it was embalmed by Undertaker
Lawrence and brought to port.
The Algerine traversed a large area
of the ocean but found no other
bodies. Yesterday Capt. Jackman
sent a wireless to the owners here,
stating that the prospects of finding
more bodies were not at all favorable.
He believed that the remaining vic-
tims had sunk to bottom.

The S. S. Rappahannock, Captain
Hanks, arrived from London at 7
o'clock last evening after an eleven
days passage, in the latter part of
which the steamer was enveloped in
fog. At the outset fairly good weather
prevailed until Saturday last when
the thick fog set in. The following
morning the bow of the ship was
scarcely discernible from the bridge,
and on the same day she had a close
call from a collision with a large ice-
berg. The berg was viewed by pas-
sengers on deck as it passed the ship.
The Rappahannock brought 24 bags
of mail, 800 tons of cargo including a
quantity of dynamite, and as passen-
gers:—E. C. Robinson, Douglas Rog-
ers and W. C. Bellamy; Mrs. Hunter
is en route to Halifax.

Shot Dad
to Get Girl.

MICHIGAN'S YOUNG LOCHINVAR.

Now Runaway Pair Are Hidden in
Swamp Defying Arrest—Domestic
Tragedies Across Border.

Mottville, Mich., June 1.—Armed
with a rifle and defying arrest, Chas.
McGinnes, a young farmhand, and
Rose Kindy, daughter of Geo. Kindy,
a farmer living here, last night took
refuge in a patch of woods in the
midst of a swamp two miles from this
village, after McGinnes had shot and
seriously wounded the girl's father,
who had refused to sanction the mar-
riage.

Last night Kindy and his wife went
for a drive, taking the girl, McGinnes,
employed on a neighbouring farm,
confronted them with a rifle.
"Can I have your daughter?" he
demanded.

"No," was Kindy's reply. McGinnes
fired, the bullet lodging in the farmer's
neck, and the girl jumped from the
buggy and fled with her lover. A
deputy sheriff, who followed the run-
away couple, was fired upon.

Jewelry Woman's Crime.

Nashville, Tenn., June 1.—Mrs. Jes-
sie C. Barnes shot and killed Mrs. W.
W. Judd last night at Buffalo Valley,
Tenn., as the result of attentions the
dead woman is charged with having
paid to Mrs. Barnes' husband.

The shooting took place on a train
platform. Mrs. Judd had been to
Nashville, and was returning to her
home at Double Springs, Tenn., where
she owns a hotel. Mrs. Barnes board-
ed the train a few miles from Buffalo
Valley, walked to the car platform
where her victim was standing, and
calmly fired three bullets into her
body.

Barnes formerly was a distiller,
and is a prominent land owner. He
married Mrs. Barnes four years ago
at Evansville, Ind.

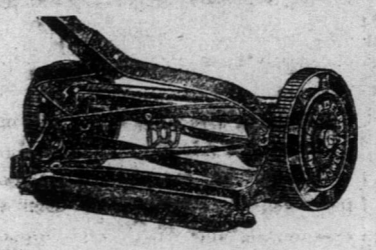

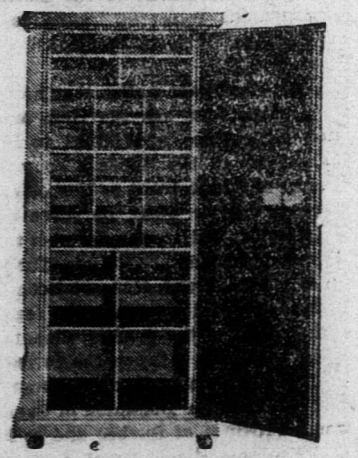
