Those Appointments a Gross Outrage.

The public generally recognize the appointment of the Hon. R. Watson to the Cashiership of the Government Savings Bank as a confession of weakness on the part of the Government. It plainly shows that the Morris Government has lost confidence in themselves and that they realize that the electorate will not return them to power. It is an acknowledgment too in fact that the Morris Party have no hope of Mr. Watson's return for Trinity Bay. If there had been any hope in their breast of the Government's return, the Savings Bank office would not have been filled until after the election, for if successful they could have filled it without the odium which attaches to the appointment at the present time. Moreover, Mr. Watson would not have been so anxious to secure the office, if he had any reasonable expectation that the Morris Government would be successful at the polls. If he could have secured his return for Trinity Bay District, he would have had the choice of retaining the office of Colonial Secretary or of obtaining the appointment at the Savings Bank. There can be little doubt, if he had felt sure of both contingencies turning out favourably, he would not have vacated his seat in the Executive Council and his portfolio as Colonial Secretary. As he had no confidence in either contingency, he determined to secure a permanency, if possible, and "get in out of the wet." He, therefore, became a party to this outrage on public sentiment, and accepted a benefit for himself at the expense of flouting public sentiment. Yesterday, we asked if Mr. Watson was not a large stock-

holder in the Evening Herald Company at the time that Journal was carrying on the recent campaign against the Government Savings Bank. If so, we ask him why he at one and the same time, sought the Cashiership of the Government Savings Bank while the Journal of which he was part owner was campaigning against the credit of the Savings Bank. Is it reasonable to expect that any self-respecting Government could tolerate as chief official of the Savings Bank, a large shareholder in a newspaper, which has been carrying on a vile campaign against the honour of Sir Robert Bond as chief guardian of the Savings Bank, should he come back to power? Here we have the spectacle of Robert Watson allowing McGrath to hold forth Sir Robert Bond, who pledged his fortune to save the Savings Bank, as an unsafe guardian of that institution, and at the same time, seeking to hold office under him as Cashier of the Savings Bank. No self-respecting Premier could tolerate such an insult. But it is all of a piece with the conduct of the Government in packing the Legislative Council with supporters at a time the Government itself is on trial before the country. This conduct is plainly part and parcel of the campaign of the Government to rule or ruin. If the Government cannot command the electorate, they are preparing to wreck the policy of the new Government by filling up the Council with men hostile to them. It is a clear case of flouting the public will and is an example of Morris's effrontery in telling them if they will not take him then to Hades with them.

NEWHAVEN, Conn., To-Day.
Three employees of the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad are held by the coroner for being criminally responsible for the disastrous wreck at North Haven on September 2, when the White Mountain express plunged through a second section of the Standing Bar express, exacting a toll of 21 lives. Those held responsible are Augustus B. Miller, engineer Mountain express; Bruce C. Adams and Chas. H. Murray, conductor and flagman respectively of the Bar Harbor train.

NEW YORK, To-Day.
The announcement made last night by police inspector Faurot that another man was under arrest here in connection with the murder of Anna Ammiller, the crime with which Hans Schmidt, priest, is charged. Faurot, shortly before midnight, left the police headquarters for the sub-station where he said the man was held; he declared the new developments would prove fully as sensational as Schmidt's arrest. Inspector Faurot, as he left the headquarters with detectives O'Neill and O'Connor, said he was going to Upper Manhattan where they had under arrest, in his own home, a prominent physician.

NEW YORK, To-Day.
Hans Schmidt, the priest who confessed he slew Anna Ammiller in an observation ward in Tombs prison under the eye of Dr. McGuire. The warden declares the man is insane and one of the most dangerous men ever confined to prison. From far off Mainz, Germany, there came yesterday to Monsignor Mooney, Vicar General of the Archdiocese of New York a cablegram from the Secretary of the Bishop which said Schmidt had been declared insane here, and suspended by the Bishop. The message read, "Schmidt born Aschaffenburg, priest diocese Mainz, ran away from Mainz because attempted frauds, arrested by police, declared insane by court and discharged, suspended by Bishop for

acts for presenting falsified documents regarding studies he pretended have made, then left diocese."

MEXICO CITY, To-Day.
Dr. Aureliano Urrutia, Mexican Minister of the Interior, has left the Cabinet. Dr. Urrutia assigns as reasons for his resignation that the people required qualities which he did not possess. He is a surgeon, and had never before had experience in politics. His anti-foreign sentiments have not been disguised during his term of office and he said foreign diplomats here were opposed to his retention in the Cabinet. Urrutia was the author of the so-called Huerta ultimatum to the States, which was promptly repudiated by Frederico Gamboa, Foreign Minister.

MONTAUBAN, France, To-Day.
The French gunners' method of handling in action heavy artillery, drawn by motor traction, was the chief point of interest to-day for foreign observers of the grand manoeuvres of the French army. When the heavy ordnance came into action to-day, motor tyres were coupled and spread out behind the cannon, forming rails on which the pieces recoiled after firing without sinking into the soil. Over 100,000 men and a large fleet of aeroplanes are operating in the two armies opposed to each other over a wide range of country, stretching from Montauban to Agen on the north, and from Auch to Toulouse on the south. The Northern or Blue army is commanded by General Paul Pau, and the Southern or Red army by General Nicholas Chomer.

NFLD. CHILD KILLED.—Mr. Thos. Kerrivan, brother of Mrs. Byrne, wife of Detective Sergt. Byrne, recently met a serious loss in the tragic death of his little boy who was killed recently in a street car accident in Boston. Tom will be sympathized with by his many friends in St. John's. 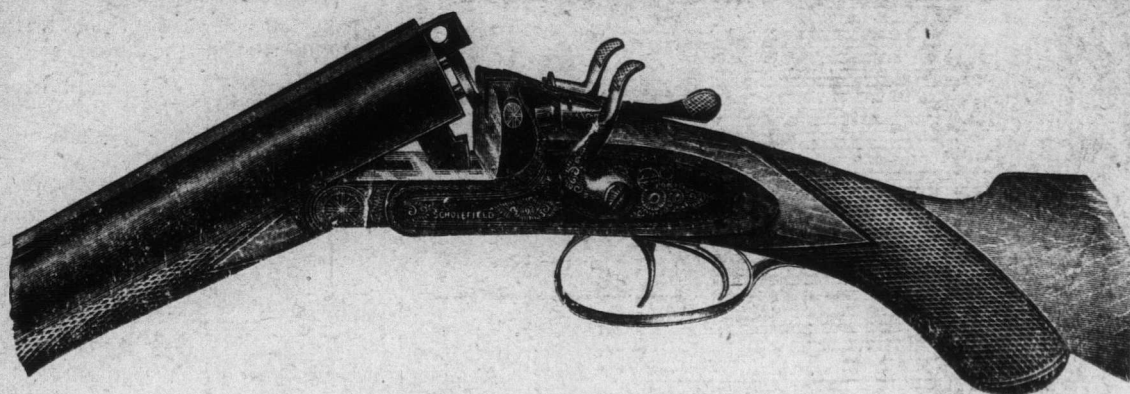

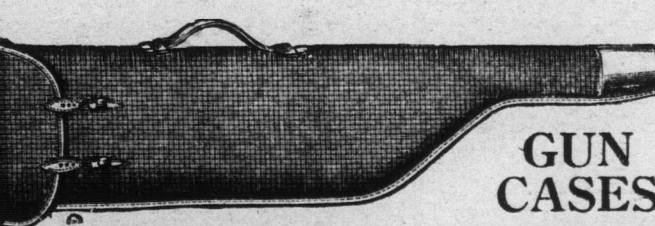

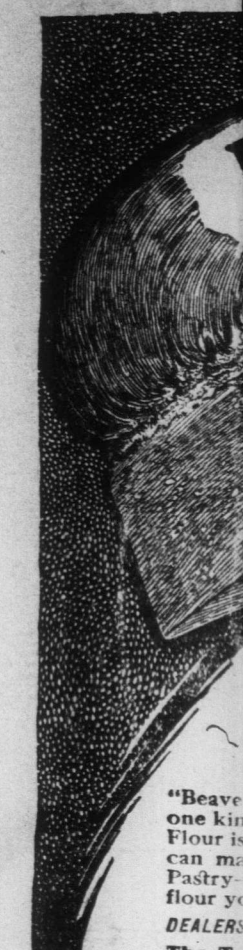
