Smallpox at Labrador.

Capt. A. Burgess, of the S.S. Dana, which arrived in port last night, having reached Turnavick, the northern point arrived at by any ship this year, reports the natives of Macovick Bay to be suffering from smallpox. Several children have died from this disease and of measles, also. Capt. Burgess states that the skeletons of the influenza victims, with the flesh eaten by dogs, still lie about in places, and it is thought that this will have the effect of causing another epidemic there. The ice is still plentiful along the coast extending right along with a channel of water, from 5 to 6 miles in width, between it and the land. There is a good sign of fish at Battle and Francis Harbors, but in all other places it is very scarce. On last Monday week, while in the Straits of Bell Isle Capt. Burgess experienced the most curious thing he has ever seen. A fierce snow storm came on and lasted for 48 hours, so that when it had ceased the snow was a foot deep. This was the only time, in his experience, that Capt. Burgess has seen so much snow in July month.

Died at Montreal.

Mr. W. W. Horwood, Leslie Street, was apprised by telegram yesterday of the sudden death of his brother Mr. H. R. Horwood, which sad event occurred at Montreal yesterday morning. The deceased who was 52 years of age, had been an employer of the Grand Trunk Railway Company for 34 years and leaves a widow and 3 sons in Montreal and a brother and sister in Newfoundland, to all of whom the Telegram extends sincere sympathy.

Eighty five years ago to-day the first and only woman to be hanged in Newfoundland met her end, a scaffold having been erected on the back of the then Court House, which is the same place where the Old Union Bank now stands.

Had Narrow Escape.

What was very nearly another tragedy occurred yesterday afternoon, and but for the bravery of Mr. Sidney Skiffington, Long Pond would have claimed another victim. About 4 p.m. several men were in Rendell's field undressing, when a shout was raised that a man was drowning. Two men, Sid. Skiffington and Art. Hammond immediately rushed to the pond, undressing as they ran, and were just in time to see a lad named Clarke go down for the last time. Skiffington having the lead and being the better swimmer reached the spot first, and diving brought the lad to the surface. Hammond, by this time had reached the spot and helped Skiffington bring the lad to the shore. Artificial respiration was quickly applied by Hammond who had to be relieved by Alex. Hennebury, the latter getting the remainder of the water out of the body, thus bringing the boy round. This is Skiffington's second life to his credit in twelve months (he having saved a friend in Sydney Harbor last August), and he certainly should be rewarded for bravery.—Com.
