Splendid Coal News.

NEW SEAMS OPENED UP TO COW HEAD.

Mr. T. J. Freeman, Manager of The St. George's Coal Fields Limited, who has been visiting the coal areas returned to the city a few days ago. Seen by a Telegram representative he reported that the work on the coal areas, particularly the Howley and Tom Diamond seams which are now being developed is progressing favorably, and that he hopes by another three or four months to have at least five workable seams, namely: Jukes, Cleary, Murray, Howley and Tom Diamond ready for the inspection of capitalists. During the past summer several new seams of coal were opened up; one in particular, the Tom Diamond, called after an old trapper that claimed to have burned the coal at his winter quarters in early part of the last century. This new find, which may prove to be the backbone of the trough, has been traced across the Barachois, Robinson's, Northern Peder and Fisher's Rivers approximately for a distance of eight miles. Mr. Freeman was accompanied on his trip by Mr. W. F. Canning, surveyor, who made an examination of the coal areas and also crossed from there to La Poile with a view to seeing that the Country was suitable for a railroad and if harbor facilities in La Poile Bay were such as to warrant recommending it for a shipping port should such be selected. In this route the Company is also fortunate as the country between the coal areas and LaPoile present no engineering difficulties, the land being practically table, Little Hr. in LaPoile Bay which is one of the finest shipping ports in North America, is open to shipping in all seasons and right in the track of ocean steamships plying between Canada and Europe was selected as a possible shipping port. A new road is now being built by the Government under the supervision of Mr. Geo. Gale, a practical railroad man of Robinson's. This new road which will connect the coal areas with Robinson's Station, will be a great boon to the people of

the district, as it will open up the Country for a distance of seven miles passing through one of the finest tracks of timber and agricultural land in the Island; furthermore it will enable the settlers to secure coal at a moderate rate at the mines. Mr. Freeman says that with advent of spring when the various nations of the Western World settle down to business that capitalists will readily take hold of these areas and develop them on a huge scale. Mr. Freeman also informs us that the survey on the "Great New Road" to connect Curling, Bay of Islands with Little River, a distance of one hundred and twenty miles which was promoted by Mr. W. H. Taylor is being started, and that everything points to the future prosperity of this too long isolated district.

The management of the Company, the district containing the coal areas, and the people of the district are all to be heartily congratulated upon this splendid condition of affairs and the latter should support those who will encourage the development of the industry—the Cashin Government!

Motor Launch Burned.

Yesterday evening a motor launch, while leaving port with a quantity of freight for a northern outpost, caught fire and had to be abandoned by the three men, who had charge of her.
