**PUBLIC NOTICE.**

**QUALIFICATION OF VOTERS.**

The attention of the public is called to the following sections of the St. John's Municipal Act, 1921:—  
1. The right to vote for the Mayor and Councillors of the City shall be held by—  
(a) all British subjects of the age of twenty-one years and upwards who have resided in the City for one year immediately preceding the election; and  
(b) are owners, lessees, tenants, or occupiers of property rated on the assessment books of the City; or who are liable for the poll tax; and  
(c) are not indebted to the St. John's Municipal Council for any arrears of taxes; and  
(d) are duly enrolled on the Voters' List; and  
(e) are not disqualified by mental incapacity.

By all bodies corporate, being British subjects, which are owners, lessees, tenants, or occupiers of property rated on the assessment books of the City, and which are not indebted to the said Council for any arrears of taxes, and which are duly enrolled on the said Voters' List.

Every such person and body corporate shall be deemed to be, and is hereby described as, a ratepayer.

Each ratepayer shall only be entitled one vote for the election of Mayor, and one for each of the Councillors.

Where property is assessed to a person or co-partnership, not being incorporated, each member of such firm or partnership at the time of such assessment shall be deemed to be assessed as a qualification for voting.

Any person who has a shop, office or office in the City, and who is engaged in a business profession therein, shall be deemed to be a ratepayer, notwithstanding that his residence may be outside the City.

No person of a body corporate shall be entitled to vote individually in respect of property belonging to the body, but every body corporate shall be deemed to be a ratepayer and shall be entitled to be given by any of its members appointed in writing by the body for that purpose.

When property is held by an executor, administrator, trustee, or other person in trust for the use or benefit of others, the person beneficially entitled shall be held to be the ratepayer in respect of such property.

Within the past week or two several Labrador schooners have arrived home, among them being, Snowdrift, Capt. Jno. Parsons; Flower of Home, Capt. R. Noseworthy; Kestrel, Capt. W. Roach; Raleigh, Capt. W. T. Noel, and Dorothy, Capt. E. Pike.

The schooner "Aramis," which went ashore on the Bar on the 18th inst., was refloated on Saturday at noon by the assistance of the tug D. P. Ingraham, and was towed in the harbor. Since then she was submerged and the matter of refloating her is again being worked upon. Some more coal is still on board, and men yesterday and to-day have been endeavoring to remove it. Mr. P. Moore, who was in town on Monday regarding the salvage, has returned to the city.

Schr. Silver Star, William Day, master, arrived in port on Monday from St. John's.

S.S. Lobelia, Captain Taylor, arrived in port from Labrador on Monday and landed some crews and freight, etc. here, after which she proceeded to the other places of call in the Bay.

Rugby is at present played only at the Methodist and Bishop Feild Colleges, and there is a challenge shield up for competition between these two schools. School rugby was instituted in Newfoundland in 1914.
