 ordered the prospective customer.

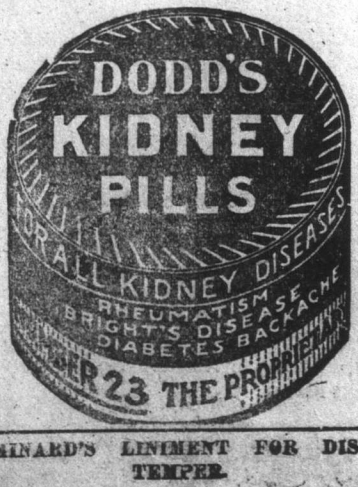
The young man bowed himself out.
