S. Government Issues Injunction Against Strikers.

Labor Unions May Also be Proceeded Against - Canadian Troops Will Leave Cape Breton - Griffith's Body to be Exhumed.

A DRASTIC STEP.
CHICAGO, Sept. 1. - One of the most drastic steps ever attempted in a strike situation, the United States Government today obtained a temporary restraining order from the Federal Judge James H. Wilson, upon petition of United States Attorney General, Harry Bagbert, who came here from Washington to argue for the action. The order enjoins, until the hearing, railway employees, attorneys, sergeants, agents, associates, and all persons acting in aid or in conjunction with them in any manner, from interfering with, hindering or obstructing the railway companies, their agents, agents or employees in the operation of their respective railroads and from transportation of passengers and property in interstate commerce and carriage of mails and from any manner interfering with the employees engaged in the repair, operation and use of trains, locomotives and other equipment and from attempting to prevent any person from freely entering into or continuing in the employ of the companies for the purpose of inspection and repair of locomotives and cars etc. The underlying principle involved in the action, the Attorney General said, is the survival and supremacy of the Government of the United States. He asserted the government expected to use its authority to prevent labor unions from destroying the open road.

TROOPS WITHDRAWING.
SYDNEY, N.S., Sept. 1. - The official responsible for bringing the troops in to the Cape Breton area signed a request on Friday for their withdrawal, and it is expected that all will have left by Saturday night. The strike is now over and the men are expected to return to work on Tuesday, the referendum results having been three to

across the river, accompanied by rifle firing. The Free State garrison promptly returned the fire and after twenty minutes the irregulars fled. To-day was the third or fourth time the Four Courts hotel has been attacked recently. The other attacks were as easily repulsed.

BRITISH COLUMBIA RAILWAY.
VICTORIA, Sept. 1. - Unless the people of British Columbia are prepared to continue paying two and a half millions annually for the ten years on the investment already made in the Pacific Great Eastern Railway, the whole system should be abandoned, asserts J. G. Sullivan, in his report to the Provincial Government which dismisses the possibility of handing it over to a private concern as no large privately owned concern would take it.

NO HOPE.
JACKSON, CALIF., Sept. 1. - There is no hope of getting a tunnel through to the forty-seven miners entombed in Argonaut mine until next week, but strenuous efforts are being made to bore through the intervening wall of earth. Fire is out in the Argonaut mine but the heat is intense and rescue workers cannot get through.

BOOZE RUNNER FIRED ON.
NEW YORK, Sept. 1. - The steam trawler Gamma, bound from Halifax to Havana, with three thousand cases of whisky, was fired on by a prohibition cutter of Montauk Point before her capture on Wednesday night according to the New York World, which declares that three shots were fired at the alleged booze runner. It is claimed the Gamma was attempting to discharge her cargo of liquor into small boats within the 3 mile limit.

ST. ANTHONY'S RADIIUM.
MONTREAL, Sept. 1. - "St. Anthony's Hospital is in possession of fifty milligrams of radium, the only supply of that precious metal in Newfoundland, and as a result we have been swamped by cancer cases, and fortunately we have been able to do good for those suffering from external infections, such as those of lip and mouth." The speaker was Dr. Wilfred Grenfell, C.M.G., Superintendent of the Labrador Medical Mission. Dr. Grenfell, accompanied by Mrs. Grenfell, arrived in Montreal to-day, having booked passage to Europe on the Liner Regina.

FOUR COURTS AGAIN ATTACKED.
DUBLIN, Sept. 1. - Snipers this morning attacked the Free State Army posts, and citizens became alarmed by the sustained rifle fire and machine gun fire and the explosion of hand grenades at various points. Revolver fire was directed at the Grand Bank of Ireland and at the Four Courts hotel. The mutineers also had a Thompson gun on the south side of the quays from which they sent a hail of bullets.
