If the leader lacks sufficient enthusiasm to improve his or her own position, it is unlikely that any great amount of zeal will flow from that source. It is however gratifying to find many of the teachers pressing on in their pursuit of knowledge, gaining a reputation for themselves and adding materially to the standing of the institutions of which they are in charge.
