It s understood that the Emperor remarked to his entourage that he believed that the terms of his reply would be acceptable. the dispatch affirms that the letters referred to the political situation, and that his Majesty, in his reply, in brief general terms proffered his hand to the English people. The latter, it is said, also confirms the assurances given by the German Ministers that Emperor had no intention of casting a slur on the dignity of England.
