Just a Mass of Contradictions

Is the Budget of News From the Far East.

Paris has Information That the Consuls at Pekin Were Not Massacred—St. Petersburg Has "Definite News" That They Were Butchered on the 6th of July—Russia Pouring in Her Troops Over the Northern Frontier of China.

Paris, July 20.—The foreign office has received information from a Chinese source, in which, however, certain reliance may be placed, that the foreign ministers at Pekin have not been massacred. According to this information of July 7, the ministers were attacked and the legations burned, but the foreigners succeeded in crossing the city to Prince Ching's palace, which was then barricaded. The Europeans were holding their own up to the time the news left on July 9. Since then nothing has been heard from Pekin.

RUSSIAN TROOPS SWARMING OVER THE BORDER.
New York, July 20.—Russia is pouring troops over the northern Chinese border, but her forces are not yet concentrated, and are meeting with serious losses to the Chinese Boxers, who overland all North China, says a Chefoo special to the World.

It is reported that after the allied armies recaptured the native city of Tien Tsin, last Saturday, their shells set fire to the town. The Chinese, before they fled, killed all their own women. It is reported, to prevent their falling into the foreigners' hands.

A Native Chinese report that there are in and around Pekin at least 300,000 Chinese troops, and that the Boxers are armed with the best and most modern weapons.

JAPAN SENDING MORE SOLDIERS.
Yokohama, Thursday, July 20.—The leading papers still under the dispatch of more troops to China, but there is a growing sentiment against Japan's engaging in extended operations. The decision of the government in the matter is not known, but another division of Sendai is on its way to embark at Ujina. Many refugees from China are arriving in Japan.

The United States battleship Oregon is at Kure, undergoing repairs.

London, Friday, July 20.—A. m.—The cabinet council, convened by Lord Salisbury yesterday, came a day earlier than usual, and it is expected that in parliament throwing light upon the situation.

NEWS OF MASSACRE.
The Chinese assertions that the members of the foreign legations are still safe have been so often repeated that they are again beginning to raise hopes in some quarters. According to the Daily Telegraph's St. Petersburg correspondent, however, the Russian government is already in possession of definite news that all the foreigners in Pekin were massacred on July 6.

M. Delcasse's circular only goes to prove that so far the powers have failed to arrive at any concerted plan of action.

RUSSIA CHARGED WITH BARBARITY.
The Yokohama correspondent of the Daily Mail, who repeats his statements regarding the jealousy felt among the allies on the subject of a Japanese commander-in-chief and the general lack of unity among them adds: "The Japanese correspondents charge the Russian soldiers with appalling barbarity towards the Chinese. They declare that the Pei Ho is full of corpses of women and children, and that the Russians loaded 300 bodies on a junk and burned them."

Since Gen. Gribski, chief of staff at Port Arthur, has taken over the supreme command in Manchuria, reinforcements have been rapidly pushed up, and the general situation has been greatly improved. The Russian minister of the interior has issued a notice that the Siberian Railway is closed to private traffic.

RUSSIAN ADVANCE CHECKED.
The Daily Mail's Shanghai correspondent says: "Advices from Vladivostok state that the Chinese invasion of Eastern Siberia has stopped the Russian advance from the north on Pekin. The Russians have burned the Chinese town of Helampo and are adopting very vigorous measures."

Berlin telegrams dwell upon the immense German interests in South-eastern Siberia. They say that the many German merchants, the numerous German employees and the immense stores of merchandise belonging to Germans in that territory will compel Germany to co-operate with Russia in resisting the Chinese.

ALARM AT ST. PETERSBURG.
London, Thursday, July 19.—The St. Petersburg correspondent of the Times says:

There is great consternation here and some alarm at the serious state of things in Siberia. Not without reason was it said the other day by a very important imperial officer that we may thank providence if the Chinese do not massacre everybody. The massacre in Pekin is not even yet allowed to be published here.

The Russian press has not been pointing out that, of all the nations concerned in the Chinese crisis, Russia will in the end suffer most. The Amour and Ussuri territories have, to a great extent, been deprived of troops to be sent to Port Arthur, Taku and Tien Tsin, and now the Chinese have attacked that part of the frontier, where the Russian forces are far too weak for the present to do anything but act on the defensive until the arrival of reinforcements.

PUSHING WAR MEASURES.
"A special commission is sitting daily to arrange for the dispatch of troops. It is chartering boats. Twelve transport vessels have already been engaged, including a Danish steamer, for conveying troops and stores to China. It has been decided to send another 30,000 men to Kieft. That military district has been placed on a war footing, and a division of infantry, 16,000 men, have already started thence overland for Siberia. Other troops are leaving from the Odessa district. Three detachments are being moved into Manchuria; one up the Sungari to Harbin, commanded by Major-General Alexieff; the second from Nikolaï, commanded by Major-General Chichagoff, and the third from old Tarikhotu, commanded by Major-General Orloff."

"The war office assures the press that the combined measures of the ministers of war and finance are quite sufficient to secure perfect safety for the Russian frontier, and to rescue the Russians still remaining in Manchuria."

A GLOOMY OUTLOOK.
The Shanghai correspondent of the Times expresses doubt that the central viceroys will be able to withstand the pressure of the provincial officials to join the anti-foreign movement. He thinks that already there are signs of wavering on the part of the viceroy of Nankin, Li Kun Yih, and says it is admitted at Nankin that Li's authority is now insufficient to guarantee the maintenance of law and order north of the river, since the consuls at Yang Tse ports are arranging for the departure of the women and children.

A Shanghai dispatch also reports that Russia has been in secret negotiation with Prince Tuan's government, with the connivance of Li-Hung-Chang.

DETAILS OF MASSACRE.
The Shanghai correspondent of the Daily Express says: "Intense indignation is felt here at the honors which the British in Hong Kong have accorded to Li Hung Chang, who is looked upon in Shanghai as the originator of the whole fiendish anti-foreign plot. A Chinese merchant, who has just arrived from Pekin, gives horrible details of the massacre. He says he saw European women hauled in the street by shrieking Boxers, who stripped them and hacked them to pieces. Their dismembered limbs were tossed to the crowd and carried off with howls of triumph. He says he saw Chinese soldiers carrying the bodies of white children aloft on their backs, while their companions shot at the bodies. He gives other details too horrible to be particularized here."

MISSIONS DESTROYED.
Shanghai reports that three mission stations on Po Yang Lake have been destroyed, but it is believed that the missionaries escaped. All the missionaries have been killed and the scene of the great fight through between Kiu-Kiang and Hankow is interrupted.

RUSSIANS FARE BADLY.
The Daily Express publishes the following from Che-Foo, dated yesterday: "The Russians are hard pressed around Niu-Chwang, and have been expelled from Tien-Chwang-Tel, the scene of the great fight through between Kiu-Kiang and Hankow is interrupted."

BRITISH TROOPS GONE TO TAKU.
A Hong Kong dispatch says: "Transport with a portion of the Bengal Lancers, a native field hospital, and Gens. Gazelle and Barrow, have proceeded to Taku. The deck-protected cruiser Dido has gone to Woo Sung."

CHINESE BEHEADED.
According to the Canton correspondent of the Daily Telegraph six Chinese soldiers have been beheaded for assaulting an American medical missionary.

PILES OF DEAD.

At Pekin!

Message Direct From U. S. Consul Conger.

Supposed to Have Been Sent on the 18th Inst.

Was at British Legation and General Massacre Was Threatened.

Shanghai Report Says 60 Missionaries and 100 Converts Were Murdered at Tai Yuan.

Washington, July 20.—10 a. m.—The Chinese minister has just received a cipher cable message from Minister Conger. It is signed in English with the name Conger.

At 9:45 a. m. Minister Wu handed the Conger dispatch to Secretary Hay. No doubt was expressed by the state department officials as to the authenticity of the message.

The following statement has been given out at the state department:

On the 11th of this month, the state department communicated a brief message asking tidings of Minister Conger in the state department code. Minister Wu undertook to get this into Minister Conger's hands if he were alive. He has succeeded in doing this. This morning the state department received a telegram from Consul-General Goodnow at Shanghai, saying:

"The governor of Shan Tung informs me that he has received today a cipher message from Conger, of the 18th."

A few minutes later Minister Wu appeared at the state department with a telegram from Taotai Sheng dated July 20, which had been received by Minister Wu at 8:30 o'clock this morning, reading as follows:

"Your telegram was forwarded, and as requested I send reply from the Tsung Li Yamen as follows: Your telegram of the 15th day of this month (July 11) received. The state department telegram has been handed to Minister Conger. Herewith is Minister Conger's reply to the state department:

"In British Legation. Under shot and shell from Chinese troops. Quick relief only can prevent general massacre."

The message is not dated, but it is understood it was sent from Pekin on the 18th.
