EVERY PROVINCE EXCEPTING ONE

Gave a Majority for the Liberal Party-What the Figures Disclose.

Ottawa. Dec. 11.-The parliamentary elections for the Dominion being at an end, it is possible from a scrutiny of the returns in the possession of the clerk of the crown in chancery to estimate the popular majority in each province. The official returns for every constituency have not yet been re-ceived at Ottawa, as, for example, in Algoma, Gaspe, Burrard and Yale-Cariboo, where the elections were held only recently. In one or two instances also, there was no contest, the Liberal candidate being elected by acclamation. Furthermore, in some constituencies there was no straight party fight, viz., Winnipeg, Lisgar, South Huron and South Lanark. These constituencies have been omitted from the calculation. Exclusive of the elections, where there was no straight party fight, the government would have throughout Canada a majority of the popular vote, amounting ap proximately to 37,000. If the ballots cast for Independent Liberals be incliuded their majority would aggregate 50,000. By provinces the majorities would be about as follows:

It will provide for a court of arbitration, composed of one representative of the labor organization with troubles on its hand, one representative of the employer, and a justice of the supreme court, who is to be the president of the court. 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
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
