HURRY MESSAGE TO SMITH, M. P.

Hard Coal in New York City Sells for \$11.75 a Ton-Two Hundred Miners Resume.

Ottawa, Aug. 20. - Mr. Ralph Smith, M. P., Vancouver, left here yesterday afternoon for the coast, being advised from there that the soft coal mines of British Columbia may be compelled to close shortly. Mr. Smith is secretary of the Nanaimo Miners' Union, and it is in this capacity that he is called to the coast, in connection with the grave situation which appears to confront the

coal miners in the west. He stated that soft coal, the product of British Columbia, is used in that province for fuel, but the demand for that purpose is not sufficient to take the full output of the mines. San Francisco has been a good market for the coal in the past, but now the peo-ple and railways of that place are using petroleum instead of coal for fuel, and this is seriously interfering with the coal market. Mr. Smith will however, be back to attend the meeting of the Trades and Labor Congress at

Berlin on Sept. 15. WON'T USE NON-UNION COAL Montreal, Aug. 21.-At a meeting of the Conductors' and Railwaymen's Association Tuesday night, resolutions were adopted pledging its members not to use or handle coal moved by non union labor. The association, it is claimed, represents 20,000 souls.

FUEL FAMINE. Pittsburg, Pa., Aug. 21. - The Post publishes a story to the effect that fuel famine is threatened for the mills in this district, and that 50,000 men will be thrown into forced idleness through the lack of coal. The trouble comes from a scarcity of engines to move the loaded cars. \$11 75 PER TON.

SOME MINERS RESUME. Montgomery, W. Va., Aug. 21.—From two to three hundred miners resumed work today at this place, Red Ash, and Loup Creek.
