CANADIAN HORSES WANTED. Mr. Brodrick's new army remount scheme definitely includes Canada as a permanent source of supply for army horses. During the latter stages of the war the war office purchased in Can-ada 180,000 tons of hay, 96,000 tons of oats, 3,600 tons of flour, 50,000 serge suits, 8,875 sets of saddles, and large quantities of other war material. This administrative preference for Canadian and Australasian goods is now accepted as the guiding principle of the British spending department.

CONCESSIONS TO GERMANY. A dispatch from Pekin to the Times, written by Dr. Morrison, says it is evident that the British-Japanese agreement has given the Chinese Government confidence in dealing with foreign questions and stiffened its back against German demands. Dr. Morrison says exclusive rights have been already granted to the Germans for ten miles on each side of the railway lines, covering an area of 15,000 square miles, yet the Germans send a consul to Si Nan Foo to extort from the governor further concessions. The Germans have also applied to the director-general of the northern railways for permission to continue the Si Nan Foo line, now under construction, to join the Pekin-Han Kow line at Cheng Ting Foo.
