CAMPING OUTING BOWLING TENNIS FISHING

Findlay, Ohio, July 22.—Arcadia, a little town ten miles east of here, is on fire. The Findlay and Foster departments were summoned, but have been unable to reach the scene owing to a storm. Three oil tanks, however, were struck by lightning and are burning. Shortly after receiving word of the fire Arcadia's communication was cut off both by telephone and telegraph. This leads to the belief that the entire town is being destroyed.

There are over 1,000,000 more women than men in England today, ignoring young children altogether, and reckoning only those old enough to earn their own money. This makes female labor to some extent a necessity. For every 23 unmarried women over 10 years of age there are only 19 men of their own homes, 32 earn their living. Among married women, one out of twelve are high dignitaries, twelve are shepherds, and one is the feminine equivalent of a woodman.

Not alone in more unbecoming trades, but in those eminently calling for physical strength women have flocked to the army, the navy and the police. Three hundred of these are in the ranks of the London police. Of 60,000 work in the heavy metal trades, of whom some hundreds are blacksmiths and 100 are employed in the manufacture of jewelry and delicate instruments employ nearly 200,000 more. But the women are not only engaged in domestic service, but in the most arduous and mill work. There are 7,000,000 domestic servants in the world, of whom 20,000 are charwomen and washerwomen.

There is a little army of barefooted women on the deep seas. Women commercial travelers are nearly 200,000 and are accountants, 86 are auctioneers and several hundred are employed on railways as clerks, pointswomen or station attendants.

But it is in employment for educated women that the chief advances have been made. There are nearly 200,000 women now employed in professional work, mainly as teachers. There are 32 women doctors, or dentists, 6,000 care for the sick and nearly 5,000 act as religious teachers, excluding over 6,000 Catholic nuns and sisters. Fifty years ago the Government employed about 2,000 women; now it engages 26,000. In 1851 there were 106 women engaged in literature and science; now there are 1,443. There are 6,443 actresses and nearly 1,000 show women.

There is tragedy behind the woman worker, and one who needs it. The list of former occupations of workhouse inmates. Seventy-seven thousand women are in our workhouses today, of whom 4,000 formerly earned their own living in some definite employment. One woman out of every three of these was once a domestic servant. Does this explain the deep aversion of many poor women to domestic service? Nearly 13,000 of the workhouse inmates were once chchwomen or laundresses. Four of them were once artists, four photographers, 162 worked as women teachers, and no fewer than 624 were once sics, nurses. No woman author yet seems to have come to the workhouse.

There is not a single actress or one woman writer among the 2,844 women in the prisons today. No women teachers are in prison, although twelve men are, and no women doctors, though sixteen male doctors are incarcerated.

Another painful section of these returns relates to child labor. Seventy thousand girls and 138,000 boys under 14 now earn their living. Two sevenths of the girls are employed in cotton mills, and one-third as domestic servants. Of girls of 10 at work, one out of five is an orphan, one as a general shopkeeper, eight as dressmakers, and two as dealers. In a 232 girls of 10 are at work, mainly in domestic service.

And It Is Thought The Entire Town of Arcadia, Ohio, Has Been Destroyed.

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HOUSE DISCUSSES STOCK GAMBLING

A Motion Calling for Legislation in the Matter—St. James' Vacancy.

Ottawa, July 21.—At the opening of today's sitting of the House, Mr. Monk moved a motion calling for legislation in the matter of stock gambling and the evils arising from hazardous speculation. He made a speech in which he pointed out that a special bill for the purpose of dealing with stock gambling should be introduced, that all brokers should be licensed, that no broker should be allowed to speculate on his own account, and that any person buying stock on margin should be compelled to put up at least 25 per cent of its value.

Mr. Osler thought that the evil might be mitigated by preventing loan companies from investing in speculative stocks.

There is a suggestion that in every case the law should require an actual transfer and register of the stock, to be made by the company in the Government of all such transactions.

Mr. Fitzpatrick deprecated a disparaging remark made by Mr. Bourassa, the member for the House of Commons, who said that the Government of all such transactions should be made by the company in the Government of all such transactions.

Mr. Fitzpatrick described the members of the Privy Council as possessing the capacity of doing what is right, and to do what is fair and just. As to the purchase of stocks, it was a matter of civil contract, to be regulated largely by the provinces. The only way the Parliament of Canada could get at it was if it could be made a criminal offense. He agreed that there was an evil which required to be remedied, but he did not think it over. He added that there will be this session some amendment to the law respecting the purchase of stocks, which would meet one part of the difficulty.

Mr. Tarte said that when members of Parliament and ministers of the crown in all the legislatures of Canada were constantly speculating in stocks, it was not surprising if young men did the same thing. Last session in the lobbies of the House everybody was talking stock and coal.

It was not right for members of Parliament to be gambling in stocks that sooner or later must apply to Parliament for additional boundaries.

After some further discussion, Mr. Bourassa's motion was withdrawn and the House went into committee of supply.

The Senate held a long meeting today at which Mr. McPherson's bill to prevent the extra judicial employment of judges was withdrawn. Senator Dandridge resumed the debate on the second reading, and finally Mr. Ferguson withdrew his bill.

Senator Ellis will move that when the Senate adjourn on Thursday it adjourn until Thursday, Aug. 6.

A number of bills from the Commons were read a first time.

THE MANITOBA ELECTIONS

Twenty-Six Conservatives and Eight Liberals Were Returned.

Winnipeg, July 22.—Returns of Monday's election received show that 26 supporters of the Roblin Government have been returned against 8 Oppositionists. The result in four constituencies is in doubt, and polling is yet to be held in two. All the cabinet ministers were returned. Provincial Secretary McFadden, about whose election there was some doubt, having a majority of 16 in Emerson.

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BRITAIN'S WOMEN OUTNUMBER MEN

They Are in a Majority of Over a Million.

INTERESTING FACTS OF CENSUS

Nearly All Occupations Open to the Females—Great Advance of the Educated Women.

London, July 22.—The newly issued summary tables of the census of 1901 are full of interesting details about the prospects and conditions of women's life.

Marriage, treated statistically, reveals some strange facts. It is scarcely credible, for instance, that there are 30 girls of 15 years and 162 of 16 years married in England. Roughly, to every six married persons throughout the whole country there are more than two widows for every widower.

Very young husbands prefer wives older than themselves. One husband of 15 has married a wife of 17, and a lad of 17 has married a wife of 25. A lad of 18 has a wife of 50 and one 20 has a wife of 63. But by the time they reach 30 they prefer as a whole to have wives about their own age. Thus we find that over 800,000 husbands and wives between the ages of 21 and 30 are practically of the same age, or come in the same age groups.
