TIED HIMSELF TO HORSE

The Animal Bolted and He Was Dragged to Death.

Battleford, N. W. T., Nov. 19.—Word has just been received of the accidental death of a Barr colonist named Norman Taylor, at Lloydminster, last Saturday. When taking a nervous horse to water he tied the end of the halter rope to his wrist with a slipknot, and was evidently dragged to death, as his body was found next morning frozen stiff and still tied to the animal. He was 24 years of age, and leaves two sisters at the colony.

CANADIAN SALT MEAT

French Deputies Want the Tariff On It Reduced.

Paris, Nov. 19.—A petition signed by a number of deputies was distributed in the Chamber of Deputies, proposing to allow salt meats from the United States and Canada to benefit by the minimum tariff. Twelve influential deputies signed the petition. It is pointed out that the application of the maximum tariff has resulted in the absolute prohibition of the importation of American pork, causing serious loss to the business of French houses, while France was secured with reprisals on the part of the United States, which the Franco-American agreement provides for. The petition closes with an earnest appeal that the minimum tariff be made 30 francs on 100 kilos.

IS NEXT TO THE POPE

Merry Del Val Appointed Vatican Administrator.

Rome, Nov. 19.—The Pope yesterday morning appointed Cardinal Merry del Val, the Papal Secretary of State, to be Prefect of the Sacred College, a position which, under the late Pope Leo, had been made distinct from the Secretaryship of State, and had been informally entrusted to Cardinal Tisserant, who held it until now. It is a most important position, making Cardinal Merry del Val head of the administration of the Vatican, and thus centering in his hands the highest powers of the Papal government.

WRECK ON M. C. R.

Stock Train Backs Into Another, Derailing Several Cars.

Waterford, Ont., Nov. 19.—A wreck occurred in the Michigan Central yards here about 7 o'clock yesterday morning. An east-bound stock train, in charge of Conductor A. Robinson, of St. Thomas, backed into another east-bound train, wrecking three cars and derailing traffic for several hours. Robinson had orders to skip Waterford, and he attempted to take water from the scow tank east of the yards here, but the scow on the engine for some reason refused to work. The train was then backed up to enable it to take water, and in doing this the rear end of the train ran into the engine of another east-bound train, damaging the pilot of the engine and wrecking three cars on Robinson's train. The way car on the stock train was smashed between the engine of the second train and an oil car on the stock train, which was derailed and thrown on the main track. A grover named Warren, who was in the way car, was slightly injured. The auxiliary came down from St. Thomas and cleared the line.

ELECTION APPEALS

The Four North Cases Before the Court.

Toronto, Nov. 19.—The validity of the order made by Mr. Justice Osler and his colleagues in the four North York, North Norfolk and North Grey, and fixing the 21st of January next for hearing the appeals, will be argued before the court of appeal next Friday. The members whose seats are affected by the order are: North York, John Brown, M. P. P., North Perth; A. G. Mackay, M. P. P., North Grey; and A. G. Little, M. P. P., North York.

FASTER ATLANTIC LINE

Government May Insist Upon an Improved Service.

Ottawa, Nov. 19.—The Atlantic mail contract held by the Allan Steamship Company expires in August next, and the likelihood is that if the company wish to secure a renewal they will be required to provide a speedier service. There is no gainsaying the fact that the existing service is far from satisfactory. The average rate of speed is far below what it should be, and Sir Richard Cartwright, according to reports, is firmly convinced that the line has come for an improvement. It is stated that the Atlantic is prepared to comply with the wishes of the Minister of Trade and Commerce, and next summer may therefore witness the inauguration of a faster Atlantic line.

TOO MANY BALLOTS

Sensation at a Chatham Church Election.

Chatham, Ont., Nov. 19.—The congregation of the First Presbyterian Church met Tuesday night to select a new pastor. The Rev. J. C. Toombs, of Windsor, presided. The Rev. Mr. Anderson, of Shelburne; Rev. Mr. Findlay, of Niagara Falls; and Rev. Mr. McGillicuddy, of Newmarket, had about an equal number of supporters each. Mr. McGillicuddy dropped out, and then the vote on Mr. Anderson and Mr. Findlay resulted in a tie. At this juncture somebody discovered that there were more ballots than there were people entitled to vote, and a motion was passed to the effect that every member of the church should sign their names on their ballot and each voter should place his or her own ballot on the plate and not allow a second person to handle it. A ballot was then taken, and stood 71 for Mr. Anderson and 72 for Mr. Findlay. Although Mr. Anderson was successful, an attempt was made to ballot him against Mr. McGillicuddy. This caused a large number of Mr. Anderson's following to leave the church, and the meeting was adjourned for a week. Quite a feeling has been aroused over the matter.

THE COLOR LINE IN PARADISE

Remarkable Statement by Mormon Leader at Funeral of Negro.

Salt Lake City, Nov. 19.—Only one negro has ever entered heaven and the gates of heaven are closed against members of the black race. This is the latest doctrine promulgated by the Mormon Church.

The announcement was made last Sunday at the funeral services of Eugene Burns, one of the most prominent colored men in Utah. The Rev. D. A. Brown, pastor of the First Baptist Church, had just finished his sermon eulogizing the dead negro when Patriarch Miner, president of one of the quorums of the Seventies of the Mormon Church, walked up to the pulpit and, to the consternation of the mourners, began a highly sensational discourse.

He declared that the dead man could not enter heaven. He said that an Ethiopian could not reach the state of exaltation necessary to entrance into heaven. His soul was doomed before his birth.

Eugene Burns was a grandson of Joseph Smith, the Prophet of the Mormon Church. According to Patriarch Miner, he is the only one of his race who ever succeeded in gaining entrance into heaven. The reason he was successful was his fidelity to Joseph Smith, the Prophet.

Mr. Brown immediately arose and declared that no such teachings existed in the Bible. In refutation of the assertions of the patriarch he read several selections from the Bible, citing instances where men with black skins had been saved.

MUNICIPAL COMMITTEE

To Consider Amendments to Assessment Act.

Toronto, Nov. 19.—The select municipal committee will meet on Wednesday, Nov. 25, at Toronto, in the private building committee room of the Parliament buildings for the purpose of considering proposed amendments to the assessment act. Attorney-General Gibson will preside.

EXPLORERS IN PERIL

Far North Expeditions Are in Great Danger.

Dundee, Nov. 19.—Whalers just returned here report that weather of remarkable severity in the last summer rendered the passage north an extremely hazardous one. The whalers had planned to meet in June near Smith's Sound the Norwegian expedition under Professor Amundsen, but they report that they saw nothing of it. Judging by the perilous conditions of the whalers themselves, it is feared that disaster may have overtaken Amundsen unless he has kept to the west side of the strait.

The whalers found the Danish Eriksson expedition on Saunders Island in a pitiable state of destitution. Count Molke, the artist of the expedition, was very ill. The explorers, in the company of the Eskimos, were living in a tattered tent and their food was almost exhausted, except a good supply of eggs from the island. They had only one gun, and had abandoned their boat and one sledge at the northern part of Melville Bay. The Danes were entirely dependent upon the Eskimos.

The whalers left with them supplies for the following two months, but did not again see the members of the Eriksson expedition, who, it is hoped, elected to remain with the Eskimos.

ESQUIMALT DEFENSES

Dundonald May Take Them Over For the Dominion.

Ottawa, Nov. 19.—Lord Dundonald, accompanied by Lieut.-Col. Denny, director of intelligence; Capt. Newton, A. D. C., and Mr. McAllister, private secretary, left last evening for the west. The major-general will proceed as far as the Pacific coast, and en route will doubtless visit Winnipeg and Calgary to meet the officers commanding at these points and confer with them upon matters of reorganization. But the principal object of the tour is to take over the defenses at Esquimalt, which are at present maintained by the British war office, but may be taken over by the Canadian department of militia, thus constituting an additional contribution by the Dominion to the defense of the empire. The trip will also enable Col. Denny an opportunity of making observations in connection with the intelligence branch.

GLORY WHALEN CASE

The Manchester Man's Name Is John Curry.

Toronto, Nov. 19.—The Attorney-General has received a cablegram from Manchester stating that the surname of the man who confessed to the murder of Glory Whalen in May last, is Curry, not Sparks. As at first called the name was given as William Joseph Curry Sparks. This cablegram is thought to mean that the name is Joseph Curry. Inquiries were made without result to find the record of any such man as Sparks in Canada. Another cablegram, however, made in view of the new name. No description of Curry has yet come from Manchester, and the detectives believe now that the man has been committed for trial on the Manchester charge, and that a description will come by mail.

NOTHING BUT PRAISE

A Scotch Merchant's Opinion of the Dominion.

London, Nov. 19.—At a meeting of the Edinburgh Chamber of Commerce Mr. Cornack, the chamber's delegate to the Montreal congress, said that there was not a stronger or grander child of the empire than Canada. He had traveled over a large portion of Canada, hunting for old Scottish Highland settlements, and had found the only Gaelic newspaper in the world published at Cape Breton. He hoped the chamber would use its influence to see Canada get the fast line as soon as possible. One point which struck him in Canada was the beautiful adaptation of labor-saving machinery to all kinds of industry. The chamber voted an address of congratulation to the Montreal Chamber. The Scotsman says: "Judging from the large number of emigrants flocking to Canada, much of the wheat we use in the future will come from there, and with me, an independent of foreign nations."

THAT \$5,000 EAR

Has Been Grafted On Head of Yankee Millionaire.

Philadelphia, Nov. 19.—Dr. Andrew L. Nelson, of New York, yesterday performed the operation of grafting an ear upon the head of a western millionaire, whose name the surgeon says he is under bond not to reveal. The operation was to have been performed in New York, but District Attorney Jerome is said to have interfered. Dr. Nelson said: "The operation promises to be successful. The operation took place at a private hospital here, where I was assisted by a Philadelphia physician and one from New York. I think they will be willing to have their names known later. The two men were placed in opposite directions upon an operating table. The patient was under a general anæsthetic. The ear was removed from a freshly-prepared wound upon my patient's head. The half ear was being held in place by bandages and the two men were bound so that they cannot move their heads. They must retain this position for at least twelve days, to allow the circulation to come through the flap of the skin that still remains a part of the volunteer's scalp. If this half ear starts to ulcer properly, the lower half of the ear will be grafted in the same manner."
