> Coroner MacLaren's jury on the case of the late Albert Shannon, who met the G. T. R., a fortnight ago, decided been lying at death's door at the home last night that the immediate cause of of his son, ex-Mayor James F. Smythe, the accident was the neglect of the man at their rear when backing into the sandpit siding.

The fatality occurred in a dense fog in the early hours of the morning and Shannon was crushed to death in the caboose of a freight train, which was struck by the engine of another freight, which entered the siding from the east. Last night was the third night of the inquest, and a verdict was not reached until 12:30 o'clock. The evidence went to show that, al-

though there are no written regulations bearing on the point, it was the rule that a train backing into a siding should protect its rear by a flagman. Since Shannon was brakeman, and riding on the end car of the first train, the jury decided that he was as much to blame for not keeping a lookout for danger from the rear as any other member of the crew. The fact that the second train had flat-car and two box-cars in front of its engine, thus making it more difficult to detect its approach, caused some discussion, but the engineer of the second train pointed out in his evidence that since these flat-cars were in brother, A.
